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CONDENSED NEWS.

A fur trust is the latest thing out. One has been organized in the State.

A man named Carter was charged with a butcher knife at Dunmore, Ky. by a man named Slaughter.

The mill of the Little & Croft Lumber Co., Evansville, caught fire and was burned up. Wednesday night. Loss \$65,000.

Knoxville, Tenn., has a decided way of settling elections. A Republican candidate got into a quarrel with an independent candidate, and pulling his pop, shot him through the head.

Lee H. Vincent, ex-state treasurer of Alabama, now serving a term in the state penitentiary for embezzling \$225,000, threatens to make a full confession which is expected to implicate a number of prominent people in Mobile.

A well-to-do farmer named "Dock" Stevens, living near Hartwood, Ky., was fatally beaten with a axe by Covington Austin, a widow living on the adjoining farm, because he had whipped Mrs. Austin's boy for chasing his cows.

In a broad sword combat on Conway Island between Duncan Ross and Capt. Daily, they fought for five minutes. Ross in the shoulder, and Ross knocked Daily down with the hit of his sword. It must have been a very scientific duel.

John Robinson, the veteran showman, died at 8 o'clock Saturday morning. He had been for some weeks in a critical condition. Mr. Robinson was more than 80 years of age, yet until within a very short time he maintained a remarkable degree of vigor.

Henry M. Vinmont, Millersburg, Ky., was sent to the Lexington insane asylum Monday. Those who were acquainted with his habits say that his loss of reason was caused by his inveterate cigarette smoking habit.

Two physicians of Palm Springs, Cal., named B. F. Frank and Bell Griffith, got into a dispute over an old question which had long been unsettled between them. Frank pulled a pistol and Griffith a knife. Frank fired and missed and Griffith could shoot again Griffith had cut his forehead.

The Alabama State election for Governor, Treasurer, Auditor, Attorney General, Superintendent of Education and county officers passed off quietly. Cal. Tompkins, the chairman of the Democratic State Committee, estimated that the Democratic majority in the state at present is about 50,000.

During the 4th of August festivities at Owensboro an altercation arose between two negroes, Sall Bartlett and Lige Dewell. The man was about to strike the woman, when she drew a pistol and fired three shots at him. Of course she did not hit him, but a stray bullet laid out another negro named Jeff Claybrook. She was arrested and jailed. Claybrook died instantly.

The news of Gen. Sheridan's death was received with profound regret throughout the country. Both houses of congress adjourned through respect for his memory, and flags on public buildings were ordered lowered to half-mast.

Politicians in Washington are very much interested in senatorial matters up in Maine just now. Senator Frye is expected to resign, and the legislature to choose his successor will be elected next month.

Capt. Delany and his crew of the sloop Mary Lane of New London says the sloop was the vessel of the day on Saturday. It was as big as a barrel, 70 feet long, eyes as big as a hat, and 5 foot jaws studded with 6 inch teeth.

John S. Wise, of Virginia, will remove to New York this fall to accept a business offer. This is believed to be an indication that the Wise-Boston Republican electoral ticket will not be in existence at the November election to antagonize Gen. Mahone.
