Belfast Journal Answers Those Skeptical Over Thousand Disasters Between Fisher's Island and Cape Cod Chartered.

Island and Cape Cod Chartered.

Major Willard of the United States Engineer's office at Newport has prepared a map of the coast from Fisher's Island, Conn., to Cape Cod, which shows the approximate location of 1075 marine disasters within that territory, sixty of which occurred prior to 1880 and the balance between 1880 and 1994. There are four distinct groups of wrecks, the principal one being off Cape Cod. Five hundred and forty wrecks, or more than half of those recorded, occurred off the northern, eastern and southern shores of that peninsular. The other groups are off Block Island; Point Judith and Watch Hill. These four groups comprise all but about sixty-nine wrecks, which are scattered along the shores of Nantucket, Martha's Vineyard and Buzzard's Bay. A footnote states that many more disasters have occurred at Vineyard Haven than those indicated, and that thirty-four vessels were said to have been driven ashore or otherwise damaged in the November storm of 1888, but no record of these wrecks is at present available.

Four hundred and forty-seven of the wrecks occurred in Rhode Island




