





MISSION STATEMENT

To increase national and international awareness of the significance of Buffalo and all of Western New York as it pertains to the Underground Railroad Movement by recapturing the spirit of historical events through the use of drama, music and the Niagara River Crossing into Fort Erie, Ontario, Canada.

Buffalo Quarters Historical Society is a community driven organization founded by Lillion Batchelor in 1995 for the purpose of promoting Buffalo's significance in, and contribution to American history as it relates to the Underground Railroad.

Letter From Rev. H. Wilson -- Underground Railroad

St. Catherine, C.W. July 2d, 1855

My dear Friend, William Still:-Mr. Elias Jasper and Miss Lucy Bell having arrived here safely on Saturday last, and found their "companions in tribulations," who had arrived before them, I am induced to write and let you know the fact. They are a cheerful, happy company and very grateful for their freedom. I have done the best I could for their comfort, but they are about to proceed across the lake to Toronto, thinking they can do better there than here, which is not unlikely. They all remember you as their friend and benefactor, and return to you their sincere thanks. My means of support are so scanty, that I am obliged to write without paying postage, or not write at all. I hope you are not moneyless, as I am. In attending to the wants to the wants of numerous strangers, I am much of the time perplexed from the lack of means; but send on as many as you can and I will divide with them to the last crumb.

HISTORY

It is written in the pages of American history...

In the City of Buffalo during the 1800s untold numbers of courageous citizens, including white Buffalonians and freed African-Americans, took a stand for humanity and decency against slavery working together as part of a secret freedom network called the "Underground Railroad." This Underground Railroad was neither "underground" nor a "railroad," but rather a loosely constructed network of secret travel routes that originated in the South, intertwined throughout the North, and eventually ended in Canada. The abolitionist movement, made up of white and black men and women, successfully helped numerous slaves find freedom in Canada. Aided by the Religious Society of Friends (Quakers), directed by Native Americans along Indian trails and guided at night by the North Star, runaway slaves found refuge on the Niagara Frontier of Western New York.

Courageous abolitionists risked their wealth and status to aid those seeking freedom on this Underground Railroad. At this same time in history, fugitive slave hunting became a profitable business when the Fugitive Slave Law of 1850 offered a fee for the capture of runway slaves and delivering them to federal offices in the North. The network's successful operations relied heavily on secret codes during escapes that alerted passengers when travel was safe.

Freedom Seekers

It is reported that between 1830 and 1850, an estimated 30, 000 slaves of African descent made their way to freedom in Canada from the Deep South of the United States. For thousands of escaping slaves fleeing under the stars, a glowing lamp placed in the window of a "safe house" was a beacon of freedom. Many of the slaves that passed through the Niagara Frontier on foot or by wagon crossed into Canada by boat or swam to freedom. We do not know how they accomplished such a task in the face of such formidable odds, but we do know what motivated them ... a drive for a better life.

Strategically located on the Canadian border, Buffalo, New York played a key role in the abolitionist movement and was the last stop on the Underground Railroad before freedom. Many "station keepers" secretly aided the travelers, helping guide them to a safe place along the Niagara River, the terminus of the Underground Railroad in America. This important place within the City of Buffalo is now known as **Broderick Park.** It is at this site that history is once again being made!

Broderick Park

On Squaw Island, Buffalo, New York

In July of 1998, President Clinton signed into law the National Underground Railroad Network to Freedom Program. Under this new law the National Park Service is now authorized to play an important role in facilitating the national commemoration of the Underground Railroad. As a result, **Broderick Park** is now listed as part of the National Underground Railroad network, recognized by historians and scholars alike as the historic terminus of the Underground Railroad

between the United States and Canada. In addition, efforts are currently underway to have this historic site listed on the National Historic Registry in Washington D.C.

The site of Broderick Park is significant for several reasons, including:

- Being located on the bank of the mighty Niagara River, which serves as the international border between the United States and Canada.
- It strategically sits near where Lake Erie and all of the upper Great Lakes flow northwards into the Niagara River towards Niagara Falls and Lake Ontario.
- It is located on an important island between the Niagara River and Black Rock Canal (former Erie Canal). It was this same combination of Lake, River and Canal which gave Buffalo its tremendous early growth to become a major City of commerce.
- Its adjacency to the Peace Bridge, which connects the United States with Canada, and represents the long lasting friendship and peace between these two great countries.
- In later years, this site at the end of Ferry Street on Buffalo's West Side served as a major Ferry Landing for passengers crossing the River and traveling along the Canal.
- It is one of a series of waterfront parks along the Niagara River and Lake Erie, all connected by a continuous path system.

PROJECT GOALS

Broderick Park

Underground Railroad Freedom Memorial

A master plan commemorating the site's historical significance is now complete. The plan envisions a setting that is highly contemplative and passive in nature, allowing visitors to be engulfed by the historic spirit of this special site. The true essence of which was the river crossing, which provided the final avenue of freedom to all who passed through. The proposed design does not compete with, nor overshadow, the all-important views to the swiftly flowing Niagara River and the Canadian shores beyond.

Highlights of the Freedom Memorial plan include:

- A park setting that is passive and naturalistic. The Underground Railroad occurred during the early to mid-1800's, at a time when the Niagara River shoreline was more rustic. The design recaptures the rustic image of this site with the use of naturalistic plantings and many wild grasses.
- A depiction of "Steal Away to Freedom," a dramatic scene of "escape" as the centerpiece of the memorial. A number of life-sized bronze sculptures will recreate an actual setting of local abolitionists assisting a family of apprehensive escaped slaves down a ladder into a small boat ready to take them across the river to freedom. A stone wall will represent the Niagara River seawall and a shallow reflecting pool will symbolize the actual River. Another nearby bronze figure will depict a look-out person, searching for Bounty Hunters that were trying to capture escaped slaves. This

expressive scene will evoke many images of what an escape could have been like, and allow visitors the true experience of "being there."

- A sloped Lawn Amphitheater will be constructed for educational uses, historic lectures
 and inspirational concerts. The annual "Freedom" re-enactment of the Buffalo
 Quarters Historical Society will be held at this site with the River and Canadian shore as
 a fitting backdrop.
- A Stage will be constructed for the amphitheater that will also serve as a central gathering Plaza for visitors. This stage/plaza will be created from "personalized pavers," cobblestone-type "donor" pavers purchased by individuals as part of a fund-raising campaign. A major feature for this plaza area is a symbolic and interpretive sculptural piece representing the "Spirit of the Underground Railroad." The sculpture is representative of the three main groups that assisted with the movement of slaves on the Underground Railroad network. Colored blocks of stone will represent the Black Abolitionist (black African granite), the Native American (reddish local Medina Stone) and the White Abolitionist (including the Religious Society of Friends, or "Quakers.") (White granite). It depicts the uplifting spirit of those assisting the escaped slaves, with their unified strength powerful enough to break the chains (shackles) of slavery. The joined boulders will be seen rising from the ground towards the sky, forcing a large chain to break apart, symbolizing Freedom. A modern phrase of "Let Freedom Ring" will be etched into the 3 boulders. The backdrop of which will be the mighty Niagara River and the Canadian Shore.
- A major educational feature will be a Memorial Walkway, commemorating the Underground Railroad and its mission for freedom. The walkway is dedicated to the spirit of humanity, decency and brotherhood that existed between people of different races all purposed with the same goal of freedom. This walkway will traverse the park, taking visitors through the "Pages of History." Each step along this historic journey, visitors will feel like they are stepping back in time as they read slabs of pavement inscribed with historical and inspirational quotes and sayings from historic "freedom fighters," as well as the men, women and children they came to aid. Historical events, happenings and dates will also be highlighted. In certain areas, colored slabs of stone pavement will be highlighted that are indigenous to the Southern Sates where the slaves were traveling from, i.e. stones from South Carolina, Georgia, Virginia, etc. All states playing a role in the Underground Railroad will be represented, including stones indigenous to Canada, the ultimate destination for Freedom.
- Along the Memorial Walkway, a life-sized bronze sculpture of Harriet Tubman, a
 matriarch on the Underground Railroad, will be placed at the river's edge, facing
 Canada. A backdrop to the Tubman Memorial will be an interpretive wall, representing
 the Beacon of Freedom used during the nighttime travel hours, which was the Big
 Dipper and North Star.
- A quiet Meditation area will be located along the memorial walkway to allow visitors
 to sit and breathe in the spirit of the place, while looking across the water towards the
 Canadian shore. This spot will be an appropriate spot for meditation and prayer.
 Symbolic imagery and interpretive markers will enhance the special meaning of the
 setting.


- An existing park concession and restroom building is envisioned to receive a new "period" façade, more reminiscent of an old structure from the 1800's. This building could include an expanded concession facility, with a new outdoor café built to overlook the amphitheater and Freedom Memorial. In addition, if space allows, memorabilia and other Underground Railroad remembrances could form a Visitors Center and Museum.
- A new picnic area with a rustic open-air structure (picnic shelter) will give visitors a
 place for relaxation and a peaceful meal.

It is the heartfelt hope of the **Buffalo Quarters Historical Society** that people from around the world will one day visit the Underground Railroad Freedom Memorial and walk away filled with optimism, a sense of personal freedom and a deeper understanding of the role Western New York played in American history.

The Freedom Memorial will stand gracefully and solemnly along the Niagara River as a monument to courage, humanity and decency for generations to come.

Project construction is scheduled for Spring 1999 through 2000.

Under the inspired and committed direction of Mrs. Lillion Batchelor, Buffalo Quarters Historical Society was formed to preserve the rich legacy of the Underground Railroad as it relates to the role of Buffalo, New York..."The City of Good Neighbors."

- * To honor and support unsung heros in Buffalo who continue to carry the torch of freedom.



Gina Batchelor, President call the meeting to order at 6:12 pm. A prayer is given by Lillion Batchelor.

Buffalo Quarters Office Space

At the last meeting Karima, Lillion, Tonna and Gina discuss the grand opening of this office. (June 8) a telephone vote was called.

The entire space within the White Press office is our space to be shared from time to time, possibly with CEPA.

The question is posed "whom do we contact to secure the space"? Cindy tells us that "Dennis" the sub-leasing contact person can be reached next week when he returns from vacation. At that time we will think about getting something in writing.

The Ground Breaking

The Criterion Celebrates its 75th Anniversary

Gina acknowledges the Criterion is celebrating 75 years in existence and is owned by one family. We would like to congratulate them by placing a celebratory ad in the publication. Gina will check on the prices of ads by size but will table the issue until more information is provided. Frank Gist (writer for the Criterion) will get size/price info and inform the Board. Gina assures us that we will have money left over in the budget to cover the cost of the ad. A motion is called by Sandy to congratulate the Criterion on 75 years in existence. Lillion Batchelor seconds the motion.

Consecration Ceremonies

The Consecration is to be held at Broderick Park and seven (7) leaders form the community have been invited to join us in these ceremonies. Each individual will have three (3) minutes at the podium, which equals 27 minutes of speaking from our guests.

Larrived a little late and the discussion in place was regarding the upcoming Soul's Reunion scheduled for Saturday, September 9th at 5:00pm.

A sample of the <u>planned</u> Freedom Memorial is to be displayed during the ceremony. A flyer showing the memorial was shared. The actual program for the event was not available, but the format would be the same as that used in a previous similar ceremony. The actual program will include an introduction of the current Board Members following the ceremonial blessings. There will also be a lighting of candles.

Permits have been obtained, but we do need signage indicating the park is closed. The sheriff's department will be available to us. We are in need of candles and something which with to light them. We will need about 100 candles. We will also need to secure a podium. Board Members, scattered throughout the audience, will start to light candles of those participating. We are waiting to hear from the invited Ministers. One of the Board members will contact appropriate members of the media - Challenger, Criterion, etc. We are asked to ask our respective churches to announce this affair.

It is hoped the installation dinner will be held in October. We will need a lawyer/s to put together a contract between us and the bank. This is because we will have several divisions within Buffalo Quarters. We briefly heard about the plan to solicit money on behalf of soldiers and hope Catholic Charities will administer these funds on our behalf. It seems that once service men are released from duty, they are not in a financially secure situation in order to return to their lives as civilians. Buffalo Quarters is looking at stepping up to the plate to assist them financially until they can get on their feet and return whatever financial assistance we have been able to provide. We anticipate being able to do this for next year.


