







Football

An expedition into the ranks of the larger small colleges ended the University of Omaha football season on a sad note, Drake winning by 36-13. But all in all, it was a happy season for Coach Al Caniglia's Indians.

The squad ended with a 6-3 record, the best at Omaha U. since 1956 when the mark was 6-2-1. And the tribe finished out of the cellar for the first time in three seasons of Central Intercollegiate Conference play. Only Pittsburg State's 5-0 record topped Omaha's 4-1 CIC Mark.

Highlighting the season was the solid blocking of the offensive line, the stubbornness of the defensive line and the sensational performances of the backfield and end Paul Blazevich.

The stellar blocking of tackles George Jesko and Neil Galloway, guards Duane Salak and Gary Baughman and center Arch Ferguson enabled the Indians to average 4.8 yards a carry and gave Carl Meyers time to complete 49 of 97 passes. The defensive wall-usually Glen Hepburn and Jack

The defensive wall-usually Glen Hepburn and Jack Kiscoan at ends, Jack Petersen and Bob Florian at tackles and Paul Limas at middle guard-permitted only 1255 yards on the ground for an average of 3.3 a carry. Only Pittsburg State, the nation's No. 1 small college team, could solve the barrier. The Gorillas rushed for 278 yards in the CIC title game and won 34-18.

Rocket Roger Sayers, stymied by Drake and Pitt in the last two games, ended his great season with a rushing average of 9.7 yards a carry. The rocket also scored 10 touchdowns as he terrorized opponents with his long gainers.

Louie Miloni, the other halfback, wound up with 5.7 yards a try and scored 42 points. He was the workhouse of the backfield, carrying 103 times.

Together Sayers and Miloni gained 1299 yards or about two-thirds of the total team rushing total. Fullback Wayne Backes added 304 yards as he posted a fine 4.8 average.

Meyers' dead-eye arm had a favorite target in Blazevich. Paul nabbed 30 passes for 446 yards to run away with the CIC receiving title. Blazevich was also an outstanding punter, booming 33 kicks for a 34.2 average.

But most impressive to Omaha U. students and fans was the emergence of the Indians as a football power after only three victories in the previous four years. The team was placed as high as 14th in the NAIA ratings this season.


