Sewer Issue Explained To Jaycees

The proposed \$2.9 million sewer improvement program on which city residents will vote Jan. 19 was explained at the December membership meeting of the Holland Junior Chamber of Commerce Tuesday in Cumerford's Restaurant by Guy E. Bell, superintendent of the Board of Public Works; Randall C. Bosch, BPW president, and City Sanitarian Sam Stephenson.

Supt. Bell displayed maps showing the present system and the proposed improvements and explained how the program would be financed by the new vote. The Oct. 19 vote had been declared invalid because it lacked the necessary 60 per cent majority as required by state law.

Bosch praised Jaycees for their many community projects and particularly for their get-out-the-vote campaign during the recent sewer bond issue election.

Sanitarian Stephenson described serious health hazards and continuously mounting problems if sewer problems are not solved.

During the evening, it was pointed out that if necessary steps are not taken to solve the sewage problem the State Board of Health could invoke court order, eventually resulting in higher costs, probably 8 to 10 per cent for each year the program is delayed.

During the business meeting, Jaycees heard a final report on the annual Christmas Shopping tour in which 90 children participated Dec. 12. Vice President Bob Wiles presided.

Mrs. A. Boot Dies in City

Mrs. Anna M. Boot, 80, wife of Dr. Harry P. Boot, of 408 College Ave., died at Holland Hospital early this morning.

She was born in Cedar Grove, Wis. and was graduated from Oshkosh Normal School in Wisconsin and after teaching in the Cedar Grove elementary schools she was appointed a missionary to China in 1908.

The Rev. and Mrs. Boot were married in China in 1910. They retired as missionaries in 1939 and made their home in Holland since that time.

Mrs. Boot was a member of Third Reformed Church, the Women's Missionary Society and the Adult Class. Her son, E. Raymond Boot, died in 1943 while serving as an Ensign in the Navy Intelligence Bureau, Washington D.C.

Mrs. C. Patmos Dies at Age of 66

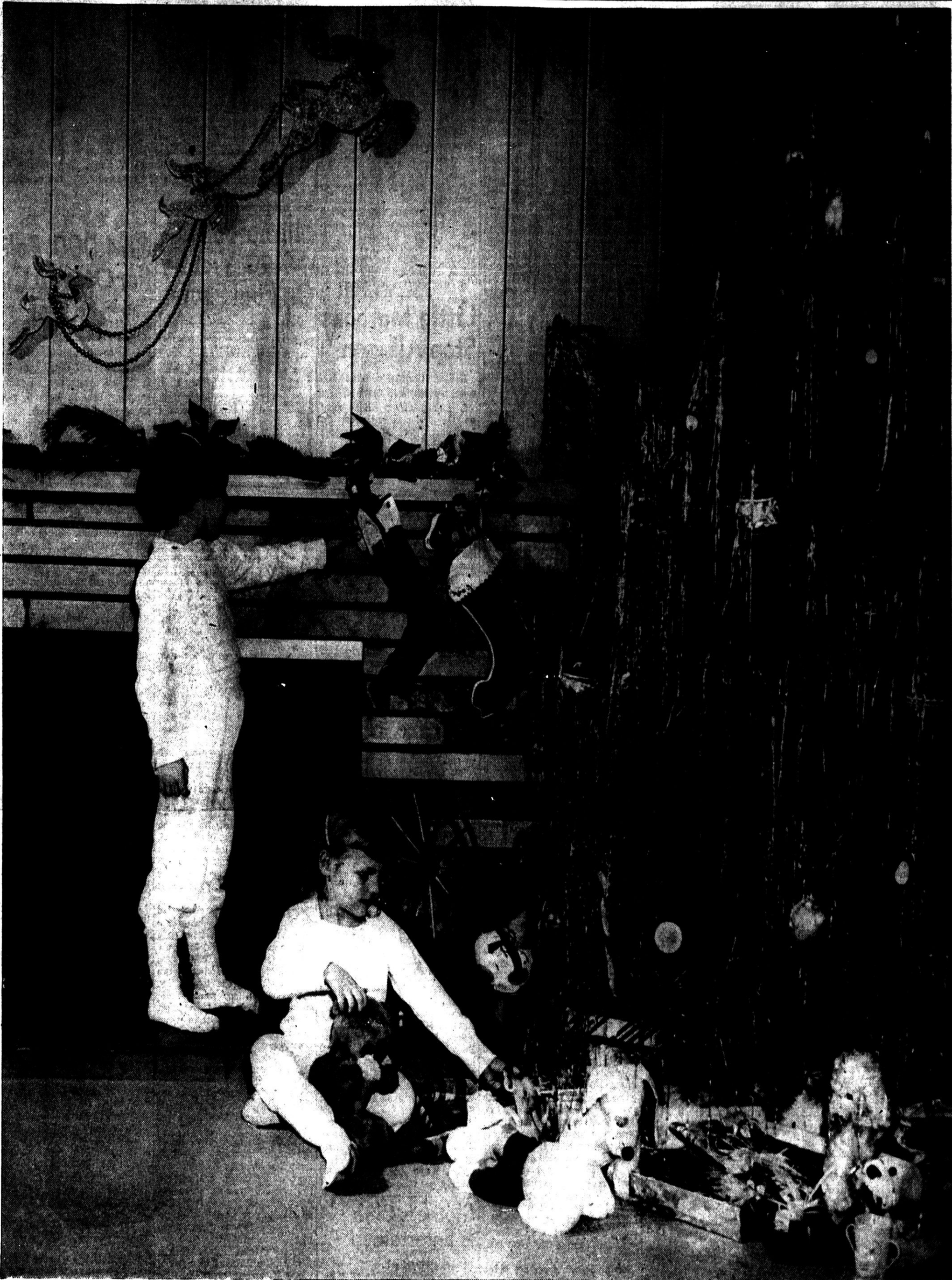

Authorities Urge Caution In Driving

Some Roads in Holland Area Slippery in Spots; Snow Due Friday

Holland settled down today to enjoy a White Christmas with all the seasonal trimmings for Friday.

A new snowfall this morning boosted the snow cover on the ground to 3 1/2 inches. Today's snow was generally "much nicer" than Wednesday's and outlined the pine trees and downtown wreaths and festoons with that highly desired Christmassy look.

Youngsters all over the area took heart, and the sale of sleds and winter sports equipment quickened. The Bequette hill at 24th St. and Michigan Ave., and coasting places all over the area were popular spots today for children on vacation. Those with ice skates will wait a while longer. Moderating temperatures thus far in December have not produced the ice on Smallenburg Park ponds which was commonplace last year.

Today's new snowfall amounted to about 1 1/2 inches, according to Weather Observer William De Boer. Added to the two inches of Wednesday, the total was 3 1/2 inches.

Today's new snowfall snarled traffic in Kent County. There were so many accident calls, sheriff's personnel were unable to respond to all calls. Traffic on main highways was backed up a mile in some places. Although sheriff's headquarters are conveniently located on a main trunkline, deputies had difficulty in getting to their destinations.

Slippery conditions on all trunk lines were reported in the Saginaw, Flint, Bay City, Lansing and South Haven areas with visibility poor.

Areas further north of South Haven, along the lake, were snow covered, along with the entire upper peninsula. State Police reported one-lane traffic on M-94 and US-2 in the Manistique and Gladstone areas.

Roads throughout the state were "generally in poor condition" and motorists planning Christmas trips were urged to use utmost caution to keep Christmas a happy event. With some highways slippery only in spots, police said motorists often tend to be careless on clear spots and then lose control on icy patches.

The Auto Club of Michigan predicted two million cars would be on state roads, with worst traffic jams coming today and again Sunday.

Today's snowfall was part of a surprisingly heavy snowstorm which swept across the Midwest and as far south as North Carolina. Up to 16 inches fell in the Midwest. Forecasters predicted another inch of new snow for Michigan but said this would change to freezing rain in the southern portions.

At least 30 persons had died of injuries suffered in traffic or by overexertion brought on by the heavy snows in the Midwest and the East. Six persons were dead in the Chicago area alone. There were 14 fatalities in Massachusetts, New Jersey and Connecticut, eight in Wisconsin and one in Iowa.

In Chicago and other big Midwest cities shoppers battled two to three inches of snow on sidewalks, auto traffic slowed to a crawl and thousands of persons cancelled plans for auto trips. Milwaukee, with 12 inches of snow, was hardest hit among the largest cities Duluth, Minn., was buried under 16 inches of snow.

Free Throw Gives Tigers 67-66 Victory

It was heartbreak hoop for Holland High's basketball team here Thursday night as the Dutch lost a 67-66 decision to Muskegon Heights before 1,800 fans in the Civic Center to spoil Holland's home opener.

Little Ron Maat found the hoop the most unfriendly when he needed it most. He fired a jump shot with one second remaining and the ball hit the heel of the hoop and dropped to the floor as the final buzzer sounded.

Maat had found the hoop friendly all evening and had scored 10 baskets, including seven in the second half. But the final try failed.

Holland has called time out after 62" junior guard Paul Adams sank a free shot with three seconds remaining. Rog Burma took the ball at midcourt and threw in to Maat who dribbled a few steps and let fly from the side with a 12-foot jump shot.

The game was one of the most thrilling of the long Muskegon Heights-Holland series and it featured some fine play on the part of both clubs.

It marked the fifth straight win for the Tigers, their second straight by one point while Holland is now 2-2. Muskegon Heights edged Muskegon 86-85 last week, overcoming an 11-point deficit in the last quarter.

The contest was tied seven times, including five times in the second half and the lead changed hands 11 times, six times in the second half.

Each team made 25 baskets in the game and Holland made 16 of 25 free shots while the winners hit on 17 of 32. Holland did the best shooting with 35 baskets in 53 tries for 47 per cent while the Tigers had 25 of 61 for 41 per cent. The quarters showed Holland with 8-17; 6-14; 7-15 and 4-7 while the Heights had 9-26; 5-15; 7-3 and 4-7.

Maat was Holland's star in the second half after Glenn Van Wieren had taken command in the first half. Maat led both teams in scoring with 22 points and he made 16 tallies in second half, including 11 in the third quarter.

Van Wieren scored 30 points for the Dutch, 18 in the first half. He hit only one basket in the third quarter and was held scoreless in the final eight minutes. Van Wieren was Holland's top rebounder, especially in the first half. He was joined on the boards by Jack Naber and Jim De Vries.

Adams, who had missed three straight free shots in the fourth quarter, was a fourth quarter Tiger spark and scored two of the four baskets. His winning free shot came on a foul by Maat. Ron Veihl hit one basket with 34 seconds to go from out about 15 feet to tie the score at 66-66 while Harold (Teeter Babe) McPherson made the other fourth period basket.

The Tigers jumped ahead 66-64 on a Veihl bucket with four seconds to go in the third quarter but Maat tied the score as the fourth period opened.

Holland then moved to a 63-58 lead with 4:42 left but along came McPherson, who engineered the drive last week against Muskegon. He hit a basket while Adams added a basket and Veihl a free shot and then Mc Pherson put the Tigers ahead 64-63 with a charity toss.

But Naber threw in a hook with 1:10 left to put Holland up 65-64 and Rog Burma, who was inserted with 1:31 left for Burton Wiersma, who left on fouls, sank a free shot with 45 seconds remaining to give Holland its final point.

Mc Pherson, 6'11" senior guard, led the Tigers with 21 points, including four buckets in the third quarter. He sank the final first quarter basket to give the Heights a 22-20 lead.

Mack Hunter hit on a free throw with six seconds left to give the Tigers a 67-66 halftime lead. It was his lone point in the game.

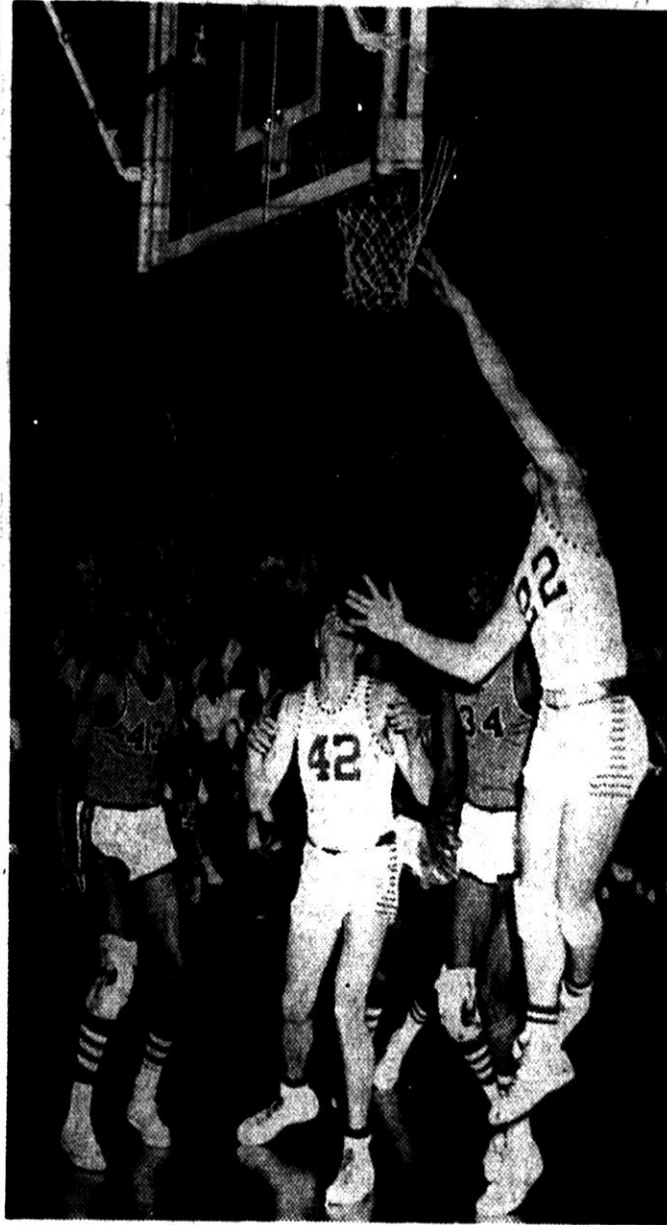

Allegan Takes 52-38 Victory Over Maroons

A victory-hungry Allegan High basketball squad fought its way to its first win of the season on the Civic Center court Friday night by defeating Holland Christian's Maroons, 52-38.

A crowd of 1,800 fans saw the Maroons even their season mark at 2-2, while the Tigers were moving up to a 1-3 record.

For Coach Art Tuls and Maroon followers the game was a nightmare and probably one of the most frustrating nights for a Christian High team in many a season. The Maroons could do little right and coupled with an 18 per cent shooting average it accounted for a bad night.

Aside from a fair first quarter, the Hollanders just couldn't find the basket, many of their shots being of the layup variety. The Dutch hit for six out of 21 in the first quarter, but then came the low point of many a ball game. In the second period, the Maroons connected on just one out of 17 tries, and that coming with nine seconds left in the half. It was 2-15 in the third stanza and 3-14 in the final quarter to add up to a dreary 12 out of 67 total.

Allegan, seeking its first win in four starts opened with a new lineup and it seemed to be the combination Coach George Van Wagener has been looking for in the last three games. They outscraped the Maroons from the start and looked like a team that wanted to win. Repeatedly they outfought Christian on the boards for an easy shot. The Tigers displayed their typical weaving, screen and roll type offense. However with most of the boys being veterans, they utilized individual options off the pattern well.

The Maroons got off to a bad start almost immediately as the foul menues caught up with Capt. Vern Wedeven again. He picked up three fouls in the first six minutes and Tuls was forced to change his starting lineup. In fact the Maroons' mentor jerked four of his starters in the second quarter in the hopes of finding someone who could find the range.

Christian held two leads in the contest, both coming in the first quarter. Visser opened the scoring in the game to give the locals a two point margin. Allegan moved out to a four point lead shortly and held it until the locals again went ahead 12-12 late in the period. A basket by rugged Roger Watson of the Tigers gave the winners a 14-13 margin at the horn.

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Then came the frustrating second period for the Maroons as they peppered away with little success. Fortunately for the Maroons their defense held the Tigers to small leads, until they broke away to a 20-17 bulge late in the period. To add to its woes Christian missed seven out of 11 free throws in the quarter. A basket by Visser with nine seconds showing, ended the famine and left the Maroons on the short end of a 26-19 halftime score.

The third quarter was a slow moving affair with the Maroons trying frantically to get back into the game. Wedeven scored both of Holland's baskets in the period while the Maroons were getting only another six points in the period. Allegan meanwhile was scoring eight points and managed to hold an 11 point lead at the end of the period, it was still 34-25.

It was a fast and furious fourth quarter but the Maroons could do little about overtaking the Tigers. Once they narrowed the count to five points, 36-31, and trailed at the end of the third period, 53-42.

Forward John Blok and Guard Robert Green led the winners with 22 points each and Tony Hinson followed with 18. Fred Goers pumped in six for the Indians and Roy Silt scored two. Guard Kelly Page scored 25 for the Cardinals. The loss was Bloomingdale's 33rd straight.

The Saugatuck reserves rolled over the Bloomingdale seconds, 47-42, in the preliminary game for their first win. Dave Shovers led the Indians with 18 points.

Holland Christian's Little Maroons notched their fourth straight win without defeat Friday night on the Civic Center court by humbling a good Allegan reserve squad, 65-42.

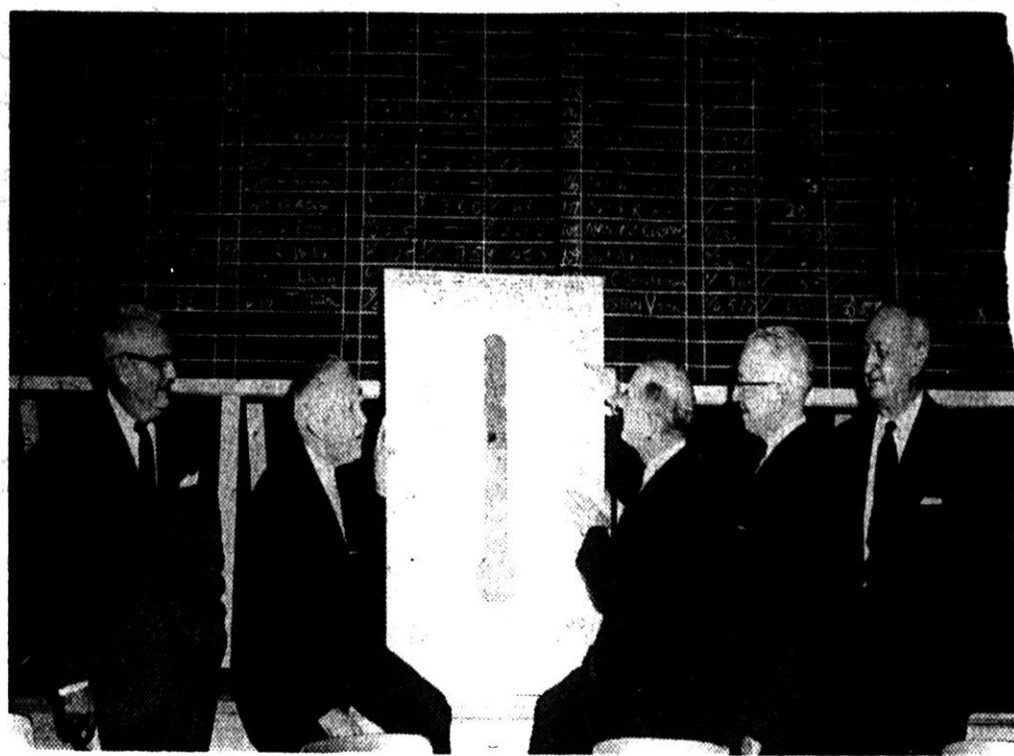

Hearing Set On Fillmore Settlement

ALLEGAN (Special) — Another legal echo of the Aug. 31, 1958, annexation of part of Fillmore Township to the city of Holland will be heard in Allegan Circuit Court Jan. 14.

Judge Raymond L. Smith has set that date for a hearing on a petition for a writ of mandamus sought by Fillmore Township against County Treasurer James Boyce.

The township, represented by Allegan attorney Rex Ott, wants Boyce to start distribution of the more than \$32,000 in sales and intangibles tax funds, all of which would have gone to Fillmore before annexation, which he has received from the state since part of the township was annexed to Holland.

Boyce is in the middle on the tax distribution problem. Judge Smith recently granted the city of Holland an injunction against the county treasurer and the township, which requires Boyce to return all money involved until the affair is settled. Holland's petition for the injunction also included a request that the township and county make a full accounting in the matter and pay the city what is due to it as a result of the accounting.

Sunday School Lesson

God, Our Help
Acts 12:1-12
By C. P. Dame

The topic of this lesson is very suggestive for the last Sunday of this year. God has indeed been our help in the past year and He will help us during the year that is coming. God helps in critical and in normal times.

1. The Church has always been persecuted. The New Testament mentions several Herods — they were all bad. The Herod who killed James, the son of Zebedee, one of the apostles, and a member of the inner circle of three — Peter, James and John — was a grandson of Herod the Great who tried to kill Jesus. James was the second of the recorded martyrs of the church; Stephen was the first. James is the only apostle whose death is mentioned in the New Testament. Luke says little about the death of James, much more about the death of Stephen and that for a reason. The death of Stephen was followed by a scattering of the believers which led to the growth of the church and that interested Luke.

When Herod saw that the death of James, for which there was no justification at all, pleased the Jews, he arrested Peter and locked him up in jail and ordered sixteen soldiers to guard him. It was Passover time and capital punishment was not permitted during that period but after the Passover season Herod planned to kill Peter. It was unjust on the part of Herod to kill James and arrest Peter and it was wicked for the Jews to applaud the killing of James. Some people today justify wrongdoing that brings them gain. This too is dead wrong.

II. Prayer is a power. Peter was the leader of the church at that time. And he was in jail. The church had no social, political, or financial standing but it had used one effective weapon — prayer, and the church prayed without ceasing. Some church members are much more important than others. Poor church members are not missed in a congregation, but the consecrated are. Peter was important to the church and therefore his release was much desired. What a contrast between armed soldiers, iron gates and doors and a group of praying people. It seemed to most people, even to some believers, that Peter had no chance. However God surprised people.

III. God hears prayers. It is true that God does not always deliver jailed Christians but He has done it and He may do it again. God sent an angel to deliver Peter who was sound asleep between two soldiers. The angel told Peter what to do, ordered him to follow him, which he did. They passed by the first and second ward, they came to the iron gate, "which opened to them" and they went out to the street where the angel left Peter who now could go where he wanted to go and he went to the home of Mary, the mother of Mark. Mary was a generous woman who let Christians use her home. Why is it that some church women are so hesitant about offering their palatial homes to guests and delegates to conventions? Our houses belong to God and should be used for Him. When Peter knocked at the door of the house of Mary the congregation was praying for Peter's deliverance but when the maid who answered the knock reported that Peter was outside the praying people refused to believe it. God had answered their prayers but they did not believe what had happened. There are still prayers offered by Christian people which are not believing prayers. The God who performed miracles in the past can still do that if He sees fit to do so.

Good laying flock management means better eggs as well as more of them, said poultry specialist Floyd Hicks of Michigan State University.

In a recent study by the United States Department of Agriculture, seven recommended practices helped the researchers market 90 per cent of all eggs as Grade A. The study covered nine midwestern states.

For each practice not followed, five per cent more eggs dropped out of the Grade A category.

The seven recommended practices are — 1. Confine Layers; 2. Provide clean, dry floor litter; 3. Keep nesting material clean and dry; 4. Gather eggs frequently; 5. Use wire baskets for gathering; 6. Use a cooling room to reduce egg temperature; 7. Maintain a reasonably high relative humidity in egg-holding rooms.

Maat made three baskets in the third quarter and Wiersma and Van Wieren added two while Loncki and Naber each came in for one bucket to push the Dutch way out in front. Loncki and Van Wieren each added free shots in the 20-point third quarter to make the score 51-37 at the canto's close.

FENNVILLE (Special) — Final reports from the Fennville Game Refuge show that the goose hunting for 1959 has topped all previous records in both the number of permits issued and geese taken.

Jay Laarman, game biologist for the refuge said that 18,344 permits were issued to hunters this year as compared to a 1958 total of 15,286.

The take of Canada, Hutchins, Blue and Snow Geese reached the 1,583 mark, which is a new record for the area.

Game officials felt that the upswing at the Fennville refuge and the comparative down trend at the Swan Creek Station was due to the peculiar feeding patterns set up by the geese this year.

An early frost lowered the corn crop in the area except for field on the south end of the Fennville refuge. This caused the geese to fly in from the Swan Creek area to the feeding grounds, bringing them directly over several of the hunting zones.

Charles Friley, biologist at the Swan Creek Station, said that a shipment of corn is expected in the area in the near future to be used through the winter if feed becomes scarce.

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Poultry Raisers Won't Bear Full Loss on Caponettes

ALLEGAN (Special) — "Allegan and Ottawa County poultry raisers are assured that they will not have to bear the brunt of the whole loss on their caponette industry, arising from the government removal from the market of ethyl-stilbesterol treated chickens," says Carl Hoyt, Ottawa-Allegan County Agricultural Agent.

Following a conference in Washington on December 9, between officials of the Poultry Division of the U. S. Department of Agriculture, Food and Drug Administration and representatives of the poultry industry, the industry voluntarily removed from the market, all birds which had been treated with the caponizing drug, ethyl-stilbesterol.

Traces of the suspected, cancer-causing drug were found in the liver, kidneys and skin of the treated birds. This came as a blow to area caponette raisers, many of whom have recently, or are in the process of, expanding their processing and feed plants to capitalize on the quick and easy method of caponizing chickens.

Hoyt said that poultry raisers in the area are being urged to process the birds immediately, at a specially inspected processing plants, following process steps set up by the Department of Agriculture to lessen any danger from the drug.

Since the only places that residue of the drug was found, were in the liver, kidneys and skin of the chickens, the processing plants will remove the offending organs prior to freezing and wrapping. The skin will be left on, but chickens will be accompanied by instructions to remove the skin prior to human consumption.

By disposing of the birds immediately, many producers stand to lose money on the birds, many of which have not yet reached full market weight. There are an estimated 400,000 treated birds in the Ottawa-Allegan area which have been caponized by the stilbesterol method.

Hoyt said that the major loss will be borne by producers with birds that have only received one of the two shots required in the caponizing process because the birds which have received both shots, will have reached full weight by the time they are processed. He did say, however, that all producers stand to lose money on future sales of the birds.

The Department of Agriculture has agreed to buy the specially processed birds at a price based on a six-month period prior to the removal of the caponettes from the market and the drug from use.

Hoyt stressed, however, that consumers may buy with confidence the caponettes on the market today. He said that all birds being sold at the present have been caponized by means other than stilbesterol and that there was no danger of stilbesterol chickens being placed before the buying public in the future.
