Dreamclock plays TD's

Local up-and-comers Dreamclock are set to play TD's tonight and tomorrow.

The band recently ended a short hiatus from touring which began after drummer Tim Newman opened his own music store, TNT Music.

Singer Eric Vassey is ready to get back to touring. "I really missed it," he says, "and I'm looking forward to playing a lot more shows."

The band is currently culling songs from their original list in an effort to put out a CD. "We're trying to get enough material up to do a disc in either March or April," says Newman. "So that's why we're trying to do a lot of gigs and preview some songs and try to get some reactions to them."

The disc, which has not yet been titled, will feature approximately 14 original not Top 40 but we're not heavy metal. We're not punk. It's very nondescript. We just like a very heavily vocal-oriented sound."

This semester the band will stick to touring areas within driving range, such as Charleston and Charlotte, says Newman. They will tour by themselves and as an opening act for other regional acts.

When asked what the band is trying to convey to the audience, Newman says, "Dreamclock is really trying to put across better written songs. Stuff with well thought-up harmonies that a wide range of people can understand."

Vassey writes 75 percent of the songs, drawing mostly on real life. But that's not to say all of his songs are about heavy topics or lofty ideals. A lot of times, it can be something minor," says Vassey, "You know? Just a small thing that sparks an idea. Then I'll think to myself 'this little idea could grow into something a lot bigger' and I'll take that and start playing with different ideas. Usually I'll get a lyrical idea and then start looking for for melodies." Looking down the road, he hopes Dreamclock will one day be in a position to play their original music to a wide audience. Says Vassey. "I could see myself doing this for a long time.'

If you haven't walked into the Coffeehouse lately, you may be missing some of Clemson's best live acoustic music.

Last Friday, Richard Tillinghast and Jennifer Goree played two sets in the cozy downtown establishment. They set up two microphones just inside the doorway. One small Peavey PA speaker sat on a barstool and another on the old church pew near the wall. A crowd of around 20 sat at the tables, eating a few pastries, sipping coffee and clapping politely.

Tillinghast and Goree, both lifetime Clemson residents, sang originals and covers of acoustic, folk and country/western songs. After a short sound check together, Tillinghast played a set of originals and covers to start the evening, fitting in a short social commentary with a cover of Woody Guthrie's "Deportee," a song about the mistreatment of migrant workers from Mexico.

During a 15 minute break, Matt Akers played a few of his originals while Tillinghast rested his voice.

Afterward, Goree joined him to sing originals and a variety of cover songs by artists as diverse as Hank Williams Sr. and 19th century composer Stephen Foster.

Goree's mother, Bunny, joined the two for covers of "I'm so lonesome I could cry" and "Goodnight Irene."

Overall, the singing and playing were tight, and the performance was friendly, professional and extremely enjoyable.



The Dentists Behind the Door I Keep the Universe ****

"Oh no, it's the Dentists! Please, don't make me go!" Calm down all you fearful kids, it's only a music group. The Dentists mix vocals and music melodies of the Bats and Midnight Oil. This is not Midnight Oil, so don't expect them to sound like them. The music is in the opposite direction.

The Dentists produce good poppy-alternative music for the enjoyment of everybody. There is no one out there that can resist (unless you're dumb and deaf) the musical force that pulls you in. This British quartet's new album on EastWest Records "blends a flair for instantly hummable melody with a double shot of cerebral post-punk attitude."

The Dentists started some commotion in America about two years ago when a couple of their compilations came out. The first, Naked, is a collection of demo's and outtakes, while the second, Dressed, is a collection of their most popular early releases. Behind the Door I Keep the Universe "thrusts and parries with a clarity belying the whirlwind recording process that saw the band a grand total of 11 days." But they must of worked hard during those 11 days because the album sounds great. My favorite groovy tune on the album would have to be "Space Man." This is where, if you have heard the Bats, you can hear the resemblance. "This Is Not My Flag" is "a wiry guitar rouser that vents the pentup aggression of the working man." All of the other 10 songs have the same musical background as these, do which produces one great album. So if a Bats -sounding group is what you desperately need for your musical collection, then pick up the Dentists-Behind the Door *I Keep the Universe.* "Open your mental door just a crack, and you'll discover the Dentists' universe.'


It may surprise you to know that Billy Pilgrim is a duo. Andrew Hyra and Kristian Bush were once known by their real names, but their major label debut on Atlantic Records has seen the group rename itself in honor of the time-traveling hero of Kurt Vonnegut's novel Slaughterhouse Five.

"Billy Pilgrim is a youthful searcher," says Hyra, "He has so much pain in his life that he escapes into other eras. For us, music represents the escape, a catharsis that we're able to write out and sing out, and hopefully people go through it with us."

The group, which hails from the Atlanta club circuit, blends two-part harmonies and catchy melodies with intensely personal lyrics. An impressive group of supporting artists also appears on the album, including drummer Kenny Aronoff (John Mellencamp), bassist Guy Pratt (Killing Joke, Pink Floyd, Dream Academy), guitarist Peter Stroud (Dreams So Real) and guest vocalist Emily Saliers (Indigo Girls).

The album catches the listener with lyrics of passion and discontent, which paint pictures of everyday people in their everyday lives. From "Get Me Out Of Here," a criticism of civilization and human folly, to "Halfway Home," the story of a man who commutes

daily between New York and Boston, to "Try," which urges people to deal with obstacles in life to the gentle "Insomniac," the album

What a name for a band! According to the lead guitarist Joe Noyes, "it stands for unity and equality between the band members. There is no central control to limit individual creativity." In other words it is a band without an overblown ego and rock artist posturing. The music on their debut album on November Records exemplifies this attitude; genuine and creative. The band hails from Atlanta and has no doubt amassed a large following in the state of Georgia, at least among its important entertainment critics from guides such as Flagpole and Creative Loafing. In fact Flagpole has declared Shrunken Head "one of the Top five bands to see in Atlanta." This is good news for those in Clemson as they will be performing in Edgar's, our own on-campus bar, on Friday February 18. The music on the album is very good, especially for a band's debut on a small label. The guitars crunch, whirl and soar behind Julian Phillip's vocals which most closely can be compared to Bob Mould (Hüsker Dü/Sugar). Among my favorite songs on the album are "Razor Star," a slow burning number that sounds like it could be radio friendly, "Crawldaddy," a frantic groove of drums and bass with intense lyrics and "Kick Me," a great "love sucks" kind of song. Other good songs include "School of Soft Knocks," "Carmel," "Deciduous," and "Whither? Hither." Directed by Michael Apted(Gorillas in the Mist, Coal Miner's Daughter), the new movie Blink stars Madeleine Stowe as Emma Brody, a blind violinist living in Chicago whose eyesight is restored after a cornea transplant. Emma is the only witness to the killer's identity. Detective John Hallstrom(Aidan Quinn) must make sure that his key witness and future love interest
