





Virtually Flawless

(Clemson and opponent shutouts)

In 29 seasons at Clemson, Coach Frank Howard's teams have shut out opponents 50 times (20 different teams). During the same period, Howard has seen his teams blanked on 28 occasions (15 different teams). Below is a breakdown of shutouts, both for and against.

CLEMSON SHUTOUTS (50): Presbyterian 10; N. C. State 7; Wake Forest 5, South Carolina 4; Virginia and North Carolina 3 each; The Citadel, Auburn, Maryland and Furman, twice each; Wofford, George Washington, Virginia Military, Virginia Tech, Duquesne, Missouri, Boston College, Rice, Duke and Texas Christian, once each.

OPPONENTS' SHUTOUTS (28); Maryland 5; Georgia Tech 4; South Carolina 3; Miami (Fla.), Auburn, North Carolina and N. C. State, twice each; Tulane, Virginia Military, George Washington, Georgia, Louisiana State, Duke, Alabama and Southern Cal, once each.

Approach Phase . . .

(Outlook for 1969)

The fate of Clemson's 1969 success depends largely on the performance of the young and inexperienced Tigers.

Graduation took Buddy Gore, Clemson's all-time rushing leader, and stripped both the offensive and defensive lines of key personnel.

Gone is Gore who led the Tigers in rushing last year with 776 yards. But returning to fill Gore's shoes is exciting Ray Yauger.

Yauger, who has completely recovered from a broken arm he sustained last season, was second only to Gore in rushing with 760 yards. The Uniontown, Pa., star has been shifted from tailback to fullback to make room for Jack Anderson.

Anderson, a converted flanker who caught 22 passes last year, will move in at tailback while Charlie Waters will be the flanker. Waters matched Anderson in pass receptions in 1968 and will team with tight end Jim Sursavage and sophomore split end John McMakin.

Quarterback is the question mark in the backfield. Junior Jimmy Barnette, who was a placement specialist last year, will battle sophomores Rick Gilstrap and Tommy Kendrick for the signal-calling post.

Dave Thompson is the center with Grady Burgner and Charlie Caldwell at guards. Caldwell is a converted defensive end.

Senior Jack King and sophomore Jim Dorn will be the tackles.

Middle guard B. B. Elvington and end Ivan Southerland are the lone interior linemen returning to the defensive unit.

Ralph Daniel and Ronnie Kitchens are expected to replace departed John Cagle and Mike Locklair at tackles. Also gone is All-Atlantic Coast Conference end Ronnie Ducworth. His possible replacement is younger brother, George.

With the departure of ace linebackers Jimmy Catoe and Billy Ware, coach Frank Howard is hopeful that Dave Kormanicki and Larry Hefner can step in.

Veteran John Fulmer returns to anchor the secondary at the right corner spot. Chuck Werner will be at the left corner with Bob Craig and Sonny Cassady the safeties.

Gary Compton, who started most of last season, could move into a starting defensive back position.

Punting chores will be in the capable hands of Sonny Cain with Anderson and sophomore Roger Kivett in reserve.

Barnette scored 27 points in '68 as a kicker hitting 15 of 18 extra point conversions and 4 of 7 field goal attempts.

Sophomore Mac Wilson, touted as having a strong leg, will provide competition for Barnette in the kicking department.

Keen Judgement.

(Clemson IPTAY Club)

From September 1, 1967 through August 31, 1968, members of IPTAY poured more money into the Clemson scholarship club than ever before.

And with the 1968-69 year drawing to a close at the end of August, another record will be set.

September 1, 1969 starts the 36th year of IPTAY and probably no other group of people have done more for collegiate athletics anywhere.

Hundreds of boys have received an education through IPTAY which otherwise would not have been possible. And the need for increased memberships increases each year.

During the 35th year of operation the club had one of its largest memberships on record. There were nearly 7,000 regular (\$20) members; over 1,100 Gold Card (\$100) contributors, 26 \$500 memberships and 11 who were \$1,000 members. These together represented nearly 19,000 \$20 memberships.

IPTAY was started—and still functions—with one purpose in mind, that is, to finance athletic scholarships at Clemson. Not one single penny contributed during the past 35 years has been used for any other purpose.

From the records available, there were 185 pople who were members of IPTAY during that first year of 1934-35. Over a third of these are now deceased, but better than 60 per cent of those still living are members today and a fifth of them are Gold Card members.

The late Dr. Rupert H. (Rube) Fike was the father of IPTAY. It was his idea that something should be done to support athletics at Clemson. His thought was being churned around when the Tigers were at one of their lowest depths of football. The team had won but seven games, while losing 17 and tieing five in three years.

The beginning of IPTAY was an adrenaline to football and the initial success experienced was more than anticipated. For the next eight years, the football teams had break even or better seasons. And the sixth season after IPTAY was born, the Tigers went to their first post-season bowl game.

Since IPTAY was formed, the Tigers have had 26 out of 35 seasons of .500 or better ball and have been to six more bowl games.

While football was to be the main beneficiary of IP-TAY funds, Clemson's other athletic teams have also benefitted from the program. Conference championships have been won in football, baseball, basketball and tennis, not to mention the numerous All-America and all-conference honors won by individuals.

IPTAY means an investment in the future. Its yearly stream of "alumni" are the leaders of tomorrow.

(The Century Club)

Coach Frank Howard enters his 30th year as head coach at Clemson and holds the distinction of having served more years as a head coach at a major collegiate institution (as classified by the National Collegiate Athletic Bureau) than any other mentor in the nation.

Howard is one of 12 coaches who has won at least 100 games. Howard, Bear Bryant of Alabama, Mississippi's Johnny Vaught, Clarence Stasavich of East Carolina, Ben Schwartzwalder of Syracuse and Ohio State's Woody Hayes have all won 150 or more games with Bryant leading the parade with 187 victories.

Two coaches, Dan Devine of Missouri and John Yovicsin of Harvard, joined the "Century Club" last year. Devine has accumulated 105 wins while Yovicsin has exactly 100 triumphs to his credit. Pie Vann of Southern Mississippi and Louisville's Frank Camp retired from the coaching ranks. Vann had 135 victories and Camp 113.

Lloyd Eaton of Wyoming has a chance to join the select circle this season. Eaton, who has been a head coach for 15 years, has won 97 games.

Dawn In History

(A Note On Clemson)

The physical growth of the Clemson University campus is almost beyond comprehension, especially for one who has not visited the sprawling complex in the last five years.

Occupied within the past year or so have been a new cafeteria, the second 10-story high rise dormitory, a student health center and the spacious J. C. Littlejohn Coliseum, home of the basketball Tigers, seating just under 10,000.

On the athletic side also, eight hard surfaced, all-weather tennis courts are now ready for play and next spring the Tigers will play on one of the most up-to-date baseball facilities anywhere.

Nearing completion are a new classroom building with a 10-story office tower and an engineering research building. Ground has just been broken on the third 10-story dormitory and plans are now past the thinking stage for an athletic dormitory, an athletic office building and enlargement of Memorial Stadium.

A student body of over 7,000 is anticipated for the 1969-70 school year, and in another six years, this will

probably jump three more thousand.

The Clemson campus, located 30 miles from the foothills of the beautiful Blue Ridge Mountains, contains some 25,000 acres, with other university facilities operated throughout the state in cooperation with the Extension Service and Experiment Station.

The main campus of this land grant university is located on the shores of Hartwell Lake, a 60,000-acre ex-

panse with over 960 miles of shore line.

The university is composed of nine schools or colleges: College of Agriculture and Biological Sciences, College of Liberal Arts, College of Physical and Mathematical Sciences, College of Architecture, College of Engineering, College of Industrial Management and Textile Science, College of Education, School of Nursing and the Graduate School.

There are 44 curriculums at the university for undergraduates, some with a five-year curricula. Graduate work toward a master of science or master of arts is now offered in 40 fields and there are 23 programs lead-

ing to a doctor of philosophy degree.

Thomas Green Clemson, who was the nation's first superintendent (now secretary) of agriculture and a son-in-law of the noted Southern statesman, John C. Calhoun, gave his Fort Hill Estate to the State of South Carolina for the establishment of an agricultural and mechanical college.

Dr. Robert Cook Edwards was named president in 1959 following the sudden death of Dr. R. F. Poole. Edwards, who had been with industry since his 1933 graduation, returned to Clemson as head of the department of de-

velopment before being named president.

Most Historic

(Clemson football history)

Th 1968 football season contained thrills, but also disappointment for Frank Howard, the dean of American collegiate coaches, and Clemson's Tigers.

One of the Tigers' biggest victories came over N. C. State, 24-19. But the disappointment was evident when the Tigers failed to win their third consecutive Atlantic Coast Conference championship. N. C. State took the title.

During the last six years, Clemson and N. C. State have either won or shared the ACC crown. The two teams tied for the title in '65 while Clemson won it the next two seasons. The Wolfpack ended the Tiger string last year.

Clemson has won more ACC football titles than any other conference institution. The Tigers have five titles and one co-championship to their credit. Duke has won four crowns and N. C. State three.

Duke and Clemson stand one-two in ACC football competition from 1953 through 1968. While Duke (.697) has a slightly better percentage over Clemson (.696), the Tigers have won more games. Clemson has a 63-27-2 mark to Duke's 61-26-2.

Duke has an overall record of 93-62-8 in the 16-year span to Clemson's 91-65-3.

Howard begins his 30th year at Clemson and has been a head coach longer than any other mentor in the nation. In his 29-year tenure, Howard has a 161-112-12 record.

Clemson has participated in seven post-season bowl games, more than any other ACC team. Clemson is 4-3 in bowl games and its 24-23 win over Missouri in the 1949 Gator Bowl was recently voted the best game in the bowl's history.

The Tigers began their intercollegiate play in 1896 and posted a 2-1 record.

John Heisman, for whom the cherished Heisman Trophy is named, took over as head coach in 1900 after the Tigers had an 11-6 record their first four seasons. Heisman coached four years compiling a 19-3-2 mark before going to Georgia Tech.

After several lean years, Clemson turned out winners four straight seasons when John Cody became head coach in 1927.

Jess Neely succeeded Cody after the 1930 season. When Neely arrived, he brought Howard along as his line coach. Neely guided the Tigers to his first winning season in 1934 and to Clemson's first bowl before he moved on to Rice.


Howard became head coach in 1940 and is one of the chief reasons for Clemson's grid success. He's led the Tigers to six bowl games and has finished .500 or better in 20 of his 29 seasons.

First Undefeated Team . . .

This was Clemson's first undefeated football team. It's the 1900 aggregation which ran roughshod over six opponents under the leadership of the late John Heisman. J. N. Walker was captain of the team which defeated Davidson 64-0, Wofford 21-0, South Carolina 51-0, Georgia 39-5, Virginia Tech 12-5 and Alabama 35-0, This was Heisman's first year at Clemson and he was to remain through the 1903 season. His record in four years was 19-3-2 and his teams ran up 731 points to 93 for the opponents.

Heisman's ingenuity in originating plays was one of his strong points. He usually had something new up his sleeve for every game.

John Heisman truly put Clemson on the football map.

State 4; Furman, Duquesne and Wake Forest, twice each; and VPI, Auburn, Citadel, Virginia, Duke, North Carolina and Texas Christian, once each). The Tigers have been shutout five times at home in 24 seasons. Between the Maryland whitewash in 1953 and the Duke blanking in 1962, the Tigers scored in 38 consecutive home games.


FRANK JAMES HOWARD

ATHLETIC DIRECTOR AND HEAD FOOTBALL COACH

Frank Howard has become a legend in his time.

No other person in the nation has been head coach at a major institution longer than Howard, and only four other active coaches have won more football games.

Howard will soon be coaching his 30th Clemson Uni-

versity team. This past August he began his 39th year on the staff. All except the first four years have been without a contract. This came after the late Prof. S. R. "Slim" Rhodes offered to put Howard's name in nomination to be Clemson head coach when Jess Neely moved to Rice in 1940.

Rhodes, who saw 52 of the storied Clemson-South Carolina games before his death, gave the athletic council Howard's name to mull over.

Howard didn't wait for another word. "Well, gentlemen, I second the nomination," he said. The council approved the motion.

"They gave me a four-year contract," Howard recalls. "Never asked for another one, and they never offered me one. Matter of fact, I lost the first contract."

With or without a written agreement, the job that Frank Howard has done and is continuing to do at Clemson has been mutually satisfactory and profitable. It has served to raise a small state-supported school, whose prior claim to fame had consisted mainly to winning the state championship, to national prominence and financial athletic security.

To Howard it has brought fame as a football authority and much-sought-after speaker on the banquet circuit throughout the country.

Long a friend of Coach Paul "Bear" Bryant at Alabama, Howard did not let the football lesson given Bryant's Crimson Tide by Missouri in the past Gator Bowl go unnoticed. "A bear is supposed to be a pretty vicious animal," Howard said, "but after that show in Jackson-ville, I understand Paul is now known as 'Gentle Ben'."

Two new coaches came into the conference this year, but that's nothing new to Howard. Since the ACC was formed (1953), there have been 28 head coaches at the other seven schools and 52 going back to 1940 when Howard took over at Clemson.

But Howard hasn't mentioned retirement. He probably wishes there was no such word.

The Clemson Football Network, one of the largest university-operated networks in the nation, enters its 16th year in 1969.

Throughout the '68 season, the network averaged 54.7 stations a game which is the highest average in Clemson history.

The Clemson Athletic Department wholly operates the network which has averaged over 50 stations a game for the past eight years.

The play-by-play will be handled by Jim Phillips with Bruce Buchanan the color man. Both are on the staff of WFBC Radio and TV in Greenville and will be entering their second year on the Clemson network.

Phillips, WFBC sports director, succeeded Bill Good-rich while Buchanan replaced Jim Kingman.

Phillips, with 16 years of broadcasting behind him, came to WFBC from his native Ohio. Phillips spent his first eight years in all phases of radio and television announcing while the last eight have been in program and sports directing.

Phillips was affiliated with WFAH, Alliance, WATG, Ashland and WIMA, Lima, all in Ohio. He came to WFBC from WFAH where he was program and sports director since 1961.

He has spent seven years doing high school and college play-by-play in football and basketball. Before coming to Greenville, Phillips was play-by-play reporter for the Kent State University Sports Network.

Buchanan is the general manager of WFBC Radio and is well-known in sports broadcasting circles througout the Carolinas. He has done a variety of high school sports for many years.

Buchanan has been closely associated with Clemson athletics for the past 16 years.

Clemson Network listeners can expect an accurate and colorful picture commentary of action taking place on the field each Saturday with Phillips as "The Voice of the Tigers" and Buchanan's colorful comments.

Photographers staffing Clemson's home games have an unobstructive view to shoot action pictures from top side in the modern press box and the sidelines are also available for those who like to shoot at low level.

The photographer visiting Clemson will find all of the necessary items available to make his job easier.

Chief photographer Charles Haralson, and his assistants, Tom Shockley and Bill Osteen, are on hand for two reasons: to shoot game films for the athletic staff and to assist visiting photographers covering the game.

Harry Durham and Jim Burns devote their time managing the Communications Center, which is equipped to handle almost any request such as game action film, video taped interviews, stills and other special photo requests within reason.

The official game movies made by Clemson as well as the visiting team are shot from a 27-foot open section right in the middle of the second deck.

Other photographers from newspapers, TV stations and other media shoot from the press box third level, sometimes referred to as the "Top of the Valley."

The 35-yard front side facing the field is reserved for cameras while the back side of the upper deck is where the famed buffet dinner is served to all those with working press credentials. Tables and benches are furnished where a leisurely meal can be enjoyed either before the game or during halftime.

Within the press box is a complete dark room where film can be loaded, processed and wire photos transmitted during the game.

Game action is shot during the first half by a staff photographer and a set of pictures (five or six prints) is furnished to any news media by the end of the game.

This rapid service is done through a Fotorite machine, a rapid print processing, and is the only one in use in the Atlantic Coast Conference and one of the few in the nation used as such.

During the past seven seasons over 3,000 photos have been given free to the press by this process, thanks to a top flight Communications Center.
