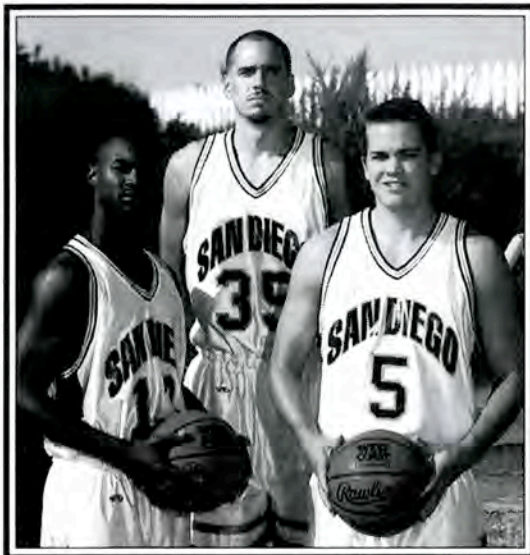

TRIO OF SENIORS TO LEAD YOUTHFUL TOREROS

The upcoming 1998-99 season will be head coach Brad Holland's fifth at the helm of the USD basketball program. The 41-year-old Holland returns two starters and six lettermen from last year's team that finished 14-14 overall and 5-9 in the West Coast Conference. Last season marked the third straight season that the Toreros finished with a .500 record or better and also advanced to the semifinals of the West Coast Conference Tournament.

With three of the top four scorers gone from last year's squad, including two-time team MVP Brian Miles (16.3 ppg), coach Holland will look to a trio of seniors to lead this year's youth movement that features eleven underclassmen.

Leading the way is 6-6 senior forward **Ryan Williams** (Seattle, WA) who is the team's top returning scorer (15.1) and rebounder (6.3) — he finished in the top-ten in four WCC categories: scoring, rebounding, field goal percentage (.527) and free throw accuracy (.779). He enters the 1998-99 season with 894 career points, good for the 24th spot on USD's all-time scoring list. Guard **Brock Jacobsen** (Glendora, CA) returns for his final season after averaging 7.3 ppg a year ago. The WCC Freshman of the Year in 1996, Brock is one of the team's more versatile players that can play both guard spots as well as the small

forward position. The third senior is guard **Lamont Smith** (The Colony, Texas), the team's defensive specialist who usually gets the assignment of stopping the opponent's top gun. His enthusiasm and hustle for the game, at both ends of the floor, should rub off in a positive manner on the rest of the Torero squad.

This year's group of seniors played a key role on last year's team that earned key West Coast Conference victories over first place Gonzaga; over runner-up Pepperdine twice; and over Santa Clara on the road. Although the Toreros finished just 5-9 in the WCC, they lost their first four contests by a combined ten points — 3 points to San Francisco in overtime; 2 points to Santa Clara and Gonzaga; and 3 points to Portland. They went on to finish the season strong, winning five of the final eight contests to finish the season at 14-14.

The Toreros only other returning upperclassman is 7-0, 285 lb. center **Jeff Knoll** (Mercer Island, WA). Voted the team's Most Improved Player the past two seasons, he will compete for the starting position at center. Last season he averaged 4.0 ppg and 3.2 rpg while shooting 57.5 percent from the field.

Other returning players expected to play significant minutes and key roles include sophomore guard **Dana White** (Phoenix, AZ) — he earned four starts as a freshman and averaged 5.5 ppg in WCC play with a personal high of 17 points in a win over Pepperdine; sophomore forward **Cameron Rigby** (Melbourne, Australia) will play at strong forward for the Toreros after sitting out a year ago — he transferred from Bradley University where he earned 9 starts as a freshman; and redshirt freshman forward **Tom Lippold** (Huntington Beach, CA) returns after missing last season due to a broken foot he suffered in game one at Stanford — he is a solid player at both ends of the floor and can shoot the three-pointer.

Sophomore forward **Michael Blackmon** (Hayward, CA), who played in 22 games as a freshman, injured his knee in the off-season and had reconstructive ACL surgery — he will probably sit out the upcoming season. Also returning is 6-9 redshirt freshman forward/center **Jason Powell** (San Diego, CA/Torrey Pines HS) — he worked hard in the off-season and has gained an additional 40 pounds of muscle and strength to his frame.

Two newcomers that will compete for playing time right away include 6-1 freshman guard **Andre Laws** (Anchorage, AK) and 6-6 swingman **Steve Ross** (Victoria, British Columbia). Laws helped lead East HS to a 21-6 mark and league championship while averaging 20.0 ppg and being named First Team All-State. Ross averaged 33.0 ppg and 14.0 rpg for Lambrick Park High School and was named Mr. Basketball in British Columbia and earned Canadian Junior National Player of the Year honors.

Additional newcomers to the Toreros this season include 6-10 freshman forward/center **Kevin Hanson** (Huntington Beach, CA/Ocean View HS); 6-0 junior guard **Sam Scholl** (Gig Harbor, WA/Tacoma Comm. College); 6-5 sophomore guard **James Borrego** (Albuquerque, NM), a transfer from Northeastern JC in Colorado; 6-0 freshman guard **Diron Mobley** (Mercer Island, WA/Mercer Island HS); and 6-9 sophomore transfer **Tyler Field** (Sebastopol, CA/UCSD) — Field will sit out this season due to the NCAA transfer rule.

After exhibition opens against the California All-Stars (Nov. 2) and High-Five America (Nov. 7), the Toreros will open their regular-season schedule at home on Nov. 17th with Concordia. Other nonconference home tilts include Northern Arizona (Dec. 3), Texas (Dec. 5 at S.D. Sports Arena in Chevron Torero Tip-Off), Montana State (Dec. 12), Occidental (Dec. 30) and UC Irvine (Jan. 2). The nonconference road schedule will be highlighted with games at San Diego State (Dec. 19) and a trip to the Fresno State Tournament (Dec. 22-23) where the Toreros will open against Miami-Ohio.

The Toreros will open WCC play with three straight bay area road games at USF, Santa Clara and Saint Mary's. USD's first home conference game will be against Saint Mary's on Jan. 16th. The WCC Tournament is back at Santa Clara's Toso Pavilion, February 27th through March 1st.

BRAD HOLLAND ——— 5th Year

The 1998-99 season is Brad Holland's fifth at the helm of the USD basketball program. This past season (1997-98) he guided USD to a 14-14 overall record and a third straight semifinal appearance in the West Coast Conference Tournament.

The Toreros won five of their final eight contests and earned solid victories over WCC champion Gonzaga, and two wins over WCC runner-up Pepperdine. Holland owns a four-year mark of 56-55 at USD — including his two-year stint at Cal State Fullerton, his career coaching record sits at 79-86. He has strung together three straight seasons at USD with .500 or better records. Two seasons ago he directed the Toreros to a 17-11 record; the 17 wins is a personal-best for Holland in six years as a collegiate head coach. The Toreros advanced to the semifinals of the WCC Tournament after defeating Gonzaga in the opener. They finished the season on a strong note, winning seven of their final nine. Included in the team's 17 victories were solid nonconference wins against San Jose State, Cal State Fullerton, UC Santa Barbara and UC Irvine. Although they came up short, the Toreros played Kansas to seven points in Lawrence (72-79) and Stanford to two (70-72) at the San Diego Sports Arena.

The 1995-96 club, hit with a variety of injuries throughout the year, finished strong and ended the year at 14-14. In his first year Brad guided the San Diego Toreros to an 11-16 overall record and a fifth place finish in the West Coast Conference. The season was highlighted early on when the Toreros downed visiting Notre Dame, 90-76, on December 3rd before 6,522 fans at the San Diego Sports Arena.

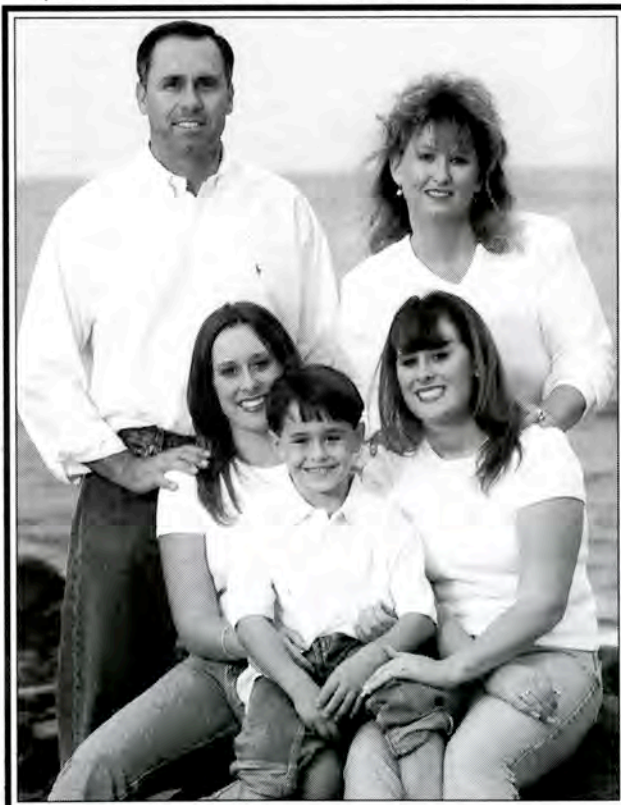
Prior to USD Holland won rave reviews for the manner in which he revitalized the Cal State Fullerton men's basketball program. During the 1992-93 season, his first as a head coach, the Titans finished 15-12 and posted the school's first winning record in four years while going 10-8 in the Big West Conference. Along the way they beat every team in the conference except New Mexico State, capping the year with an exciting one-point home victory over nationally ranked UNLV. His 1993-94 team, which lost three players to season-ending injuries prior to the start of the season, finished 8-19 overall and eighth in Big West play. They did have some memorable victories — they won at Nevada and UC Santa Barbara's Thunderdome; they won for the third year in a row at UC Irvine; and they knocked off UNLV with a 84-75 victory at the Thomas and Mack Center.

Prior to his appointment at Cal State Fullerton, Holland was an assistant coach on Jim Harrick's staff at UCLA from August, 1988 to March, 1992. He helped the Bruins return to national prominence while compiling a 93-35 record that took them to four NCAA tournaments. Success as a head coach is merely the latest positive mark Holland has made on Southern California basketball. He was a basketball and football star at Crescenta Valley High School. He was a four-year basketball letterman at UCLA and played with the Los Angeles Lakers and two other National Basketball Association teams before retiring in 1982 due to a knee injury. He entered private business and also was a broadcaster for Prime Ticket from 1985 to 1988.

Holland was the last player recruited by Coach John Wooden and became a part of four Pac-10 championship teams at UCLA from 1976 to 1979, two under Coach Gene Bartow and two under Coach Gary Cunningham. The Bruins went 102-17 during Holland's playing career and he was honorable mention All-America and second-team Academic All-America as a senior. That year he averaged 17.5 points and 4.8 assists and had a .598 field goal percentage, the best ever by a Bruin guard. He graduated in 1979 from UCLA with a B.A. degree in Sociology.

The Lakers drafted Holland in 1979, the 14th player taken in the first round, and went on to win the 1980 NBA championship. The rookie guard scored eight points in the decisive sixth game at Philadelphia. He finished his playing career in 1981-82 with Washington and Milwaukee.

Holland and his wife, Leslie, reside in Carlsbad with their three children, Kristin and Lisa, 16-year-old twins, and Kyle, 6.

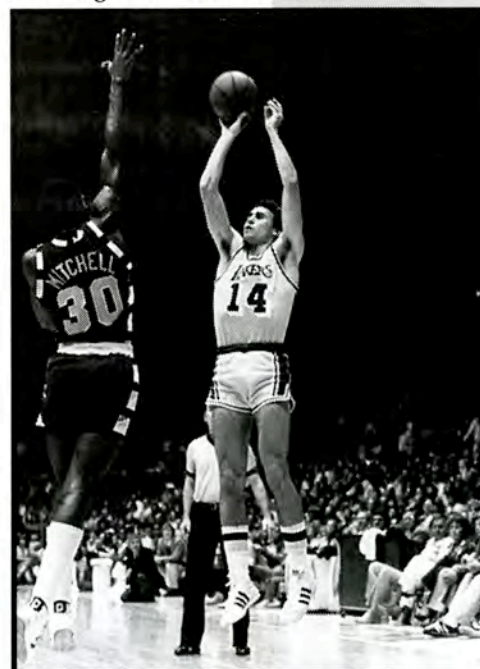


Brad starred for the UCLA Bruins between 1976-79, with those teams accumulating a four-year record of 102-17 and winning four straight Pac-10 titles. As a senior, Brad was honorable mention All-America and 2nd Team Academic All-America after averaging 17.5 ppg and shooting .598 from the field.

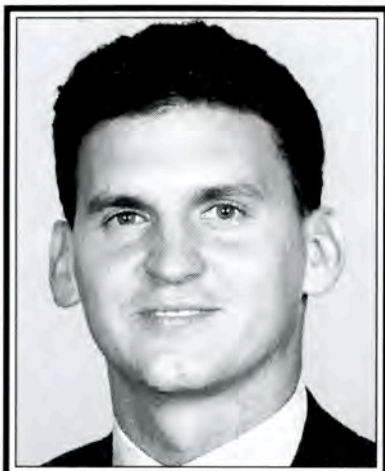

KYLE SMITH ————— **6th Year**

Kyle Smith begins his sixth year at the University of San Diego, and his fourth as a full-time assistant. He is top assistant to head coach Brad Holland, and besides assisting with all aspects of the basketball program, he is also directly involved with the USD Boys Basketball Camp. A graduate student in the USD Education Department, Kyle is working towards a Master's degree in Educational Leadership.

The 28-year-old Smith is a 1992 graduate of Hamilton College where he earned a degree in English and minor in Sociology. A four-year basketball performer on Hamilton's team, Smith helped lead his 1990-91 squad to a 26-1 season (24-0 regular season finish) and #1 national ranking among NCAA Division III teams. As a starting point guard, he averaged 10.0 ppg and led the team in assists, steals, free throw percentage and three-point accuracy.

A native of Houston, Texas, Smith prepped at Alief Hastings High School (1988 graduate).

TERRY BOESEL ————— **1st Year**

Terry Boesel is in his first year as assistant men's basketball coach at the University of San Diego. The 36-year-old Boesel comes to USD from the University of La Verne where he was head coach the past three seasons (1995-1998). This past season he directed his squad to an 18-7 overall mark and third place finish (10-4) in the Southern California Intercollegiate Athletic Conference. His squad was also ranked in the NCAA Division III West Region the last five weeks of the season. Prior to La Verne he was top assistant basketball coach at Chapman University for three seasons (1992-95); was an administrative assistant for UCLA basketball for one season (1991-92); and was assistant at Amherst College for one season (1990-91).

A 1986 graduate of Oregon State University, Terry earned his B.S. degree in Exercise Physiology. He was a two-year performer on the OSU football team as a defensive back. He went on to earn his Master of Science degree in Sport Management in 1991 from the University of Massachusetts. Terry and his wife, Joan, reside in Yorba Linda with their two children, Brittany (5) and Mackenzie (6 months).



DAVID FIZDALE **Assistant Coach**

David Fizdale returns to coach Brad Holland's staff as the restricted earnings assistant coach. Fizdale was a student assistant for the first half of the 1996-97 season while he completed his degree in Communications.

After graduation he worked for the Miami Heat of the National Basketball Association as the assistant video coordinator.

No stranger to USD basketball, Fizdale was a four-year player for the Toreros between 1992-96. A two-year captain and team Most Valuable Player his senior year, Fizdale was selected First Team All-West Coast Conference after leading the West Coast Conference in assists at 7.0 per contest. He set a new USD single season record for assists with 195 and also set a new USD career mark with 465. In addition to being the team MVP, he was also a two-time recipient of the Bugelli Leadership Award, and was selected the San Diego Hall of Champions Amateur Star of the Month (February, 1996).

He finished his USD career with 73 starts in 93 games and scored 745 points (8.0 points per game average).

TERRY RYAN **Adm. Assistant**

Terry Ryan, in his first season as administrative assistant, brings a wealth of coaching experience and knowledge to the Torero staff this season.

Over the past ten years he has been a head coach and assistant at four different programs. He spent the past three seasons (1995-98) at College of Lake County JC, the last two as head coach; he spent two years (1993-95) as assistant at Montgomery JC in Maryland with the '93-94 team advancing to the JUCO Final Four; he was head coach for two years (1991-93) at Ocean County College in Toms River, New Jersey -- his '92-93 club finished 9th in the nation; and his first three years of coaching experience came at Marymount University (NCAA Division III) as an assistant between 1988-91.

The 34-year-old Ryan earned his B.A. degree in Economics at John Hopkins University (Baltimore, MD) in 1986. He went on to earn his M.B.A. from Marymount University in 1990.

Terry and his wife, Megan, have two children, Caitlin (8) and Timmy (6), and are expecting a third child in February.





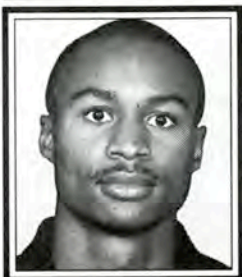

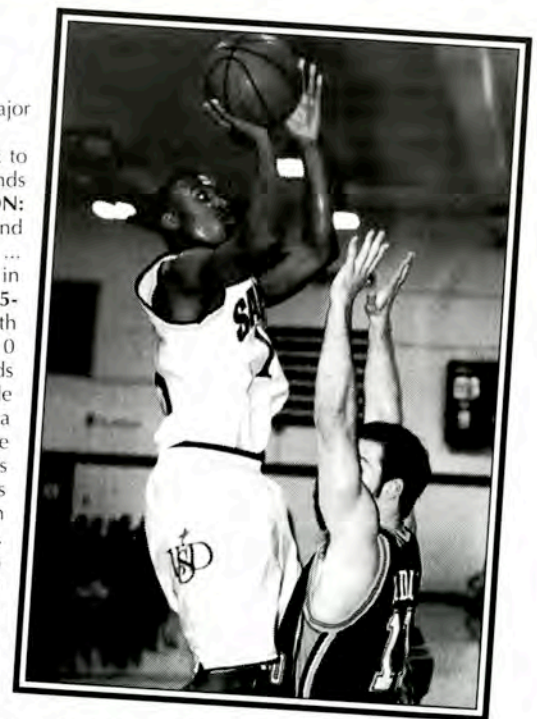

Pacific League MVP ... *L.A. Times* MVP (San Fernando Valley) ... 3-time tournament MVP ... The USD Athletic Academic Support Program is designed to assist and motivate student-athletes in their journey and progress towards their academic goals, and ultimately graduation. The primary objective is to improve the student-athletes' study skills, support them in their academic work, and encourage scholastic achievement. It is essential that student-athletes receive the necessary academic assistance to continue normal progress toward a degree while participating in athletics.

USD student-athletes receive assistance through advising, progress reports, academic tutors, campus learning centers, such as the Logic, Math, and Writing Centers, and the Accelerated Study Program. The Accelerated Study Program provides a monitored, quiet area open only to the student-athletes to ensure quality study time. These services are available to all USD student-athletes.

STRENGTH & CONDITIONING

The USD strength and conditioning program is under the direction of Steve Brown who is in his fourth year. It has been designed to develop functional strength, speed, power and endurance. The development of these physical attributes is useless to the athletes unless it can be carried onto the playing field. Therefore, adhering to a properly designed program of strength training, conditioning and nutrition can enable our men and women to become the best possible athletes they can be, while simultaneously reducing the incidence of injury.

USD student-athletes receive intensive instruction on proper weight training technique; speed, power and agility development; and sport-specific conditioning. Their strength and conditioning programs are specific to the nature of their sport or position. Each athlete is individually monitored throughout their program to ensure the greatest chance of athletic progress.

Steve was named the 1998 National Strength and Conditioning Association Professional of the Year for the West Coast Conference.

San Diego is truly "America's Finest City." A modern metropolis (second largest in California) and a popular year-round resort, San Diego spreads from the coast to the desert, including cliffs, mesas, hills, canyons and valleys. San Diego also surrounds one of California's greatest natural harbors which has been a dominant factor in determining the city's history, economy and development.

Meteorologists claim San Diego as the country's only area with perfect climate. This ideal year-round environment posts an average daytime temperature of 70 degrees, with an annual rainfall average of less than 10 inches. Most days are sunny, with humidity generally low, even in the summer. The climate, attractive setting and recreational facilities make San Diego "America's Finest City."

According to Sports Illustrated, "For sheer numbers of participants, diversity of pursuits of involvement, San Diego must rank as the sports fitness capital of the U.S." Sports are a major feature of the San Diego lifestyle. One can sail, swim, surf, scuba dive, snorkel, wind-surf on 70 miles of public beach or golf at any of the over 80 golf courses throughout the county. Balboa Park, a 1,158-acre recreation and cultural center, offers 25 tennis courts, two gymnasiums, two municipal golf courses, and one of the nation's finest zoos. Mission Bay Park is a 4,600-acre playground for jogging, fishing, bicycling, tennis, golf, jet skiing and kite flying.

As well as participating in recreational activities, San Diego supports their professional teams — the NFL Chargers and the National League Padres play at Qualcomm Stadium. During college football bowl week, San Diego annually hosts the Holiday Bowl. During 1998, Qualcomm Stadium hosted the Super Bowl game between Denver and Green Bay, and more recently the World Series between San Diego and New York Yankees. Whatever sporting activity there is, it's here in San Diego — the sports capital of the U.S.A.

SETTING

The University of San Diego is an independent Catholic institution of higher education. Founded in 1949, USD is located on 180 acres overlooking Mission Bay, San Diego Harbor and the Pacific Ocean. The campus is named Alcalá Park and is located just 10 minutes from downtown San Diego. The campus was named after a Spanish village near Madrid - Alcalá de Henares. Founded by the Greeks as Complutum, the village was later renamed Al Kala (the Castle) by the Moslems. Christians recaptured the village centuries later and founded a university whose buildings became the inspiration for USD's architectural style.

THE CAMPUS

The USD campus is regarded as one of the most architecturally unique institutions in the country, featuring 18 major buildings designed in an ornamental 16th century Spanish Renaissance style.

Since 1984, USD has completed eleven major construction and expansion projects. A five-story parking garage (1,100 spaces) was completed in 1998. A landscaped fountain plaza was finished in the fall of 1995, connecting the entrances of the Immaculata and Hughes Administration Center. In 1992, the university completed the 45,000 square foot Loma Hall, which includes an expanded bookstore, a larger mail center, classrooms and laboratories. In 1990, the renovated Katherine M. and George M. Pardee Jr. Legal Research Center opened, a facility that offers the latest in information technology.



ACADEMICS

USD enrolls more than 6,600 students who have a choice of more than 50 undergraduate and graduate degree programs. The university's academic units include the College of Arts and Sciences, and the Schools of Business Administration, Education, Law and Nursing. Class size generally averages between 18-25 students with the student to teacher ratio being 18:1. Over 97 percent of USD's full-time faculty hold doctorates.

In the annual ratings of the country's colleges and universities, published by *U.S. News & World Report*, USD moved from the regional to national category in 1994. The university is ranked among the top 100 schools in the nation.

STUDENT LIFE

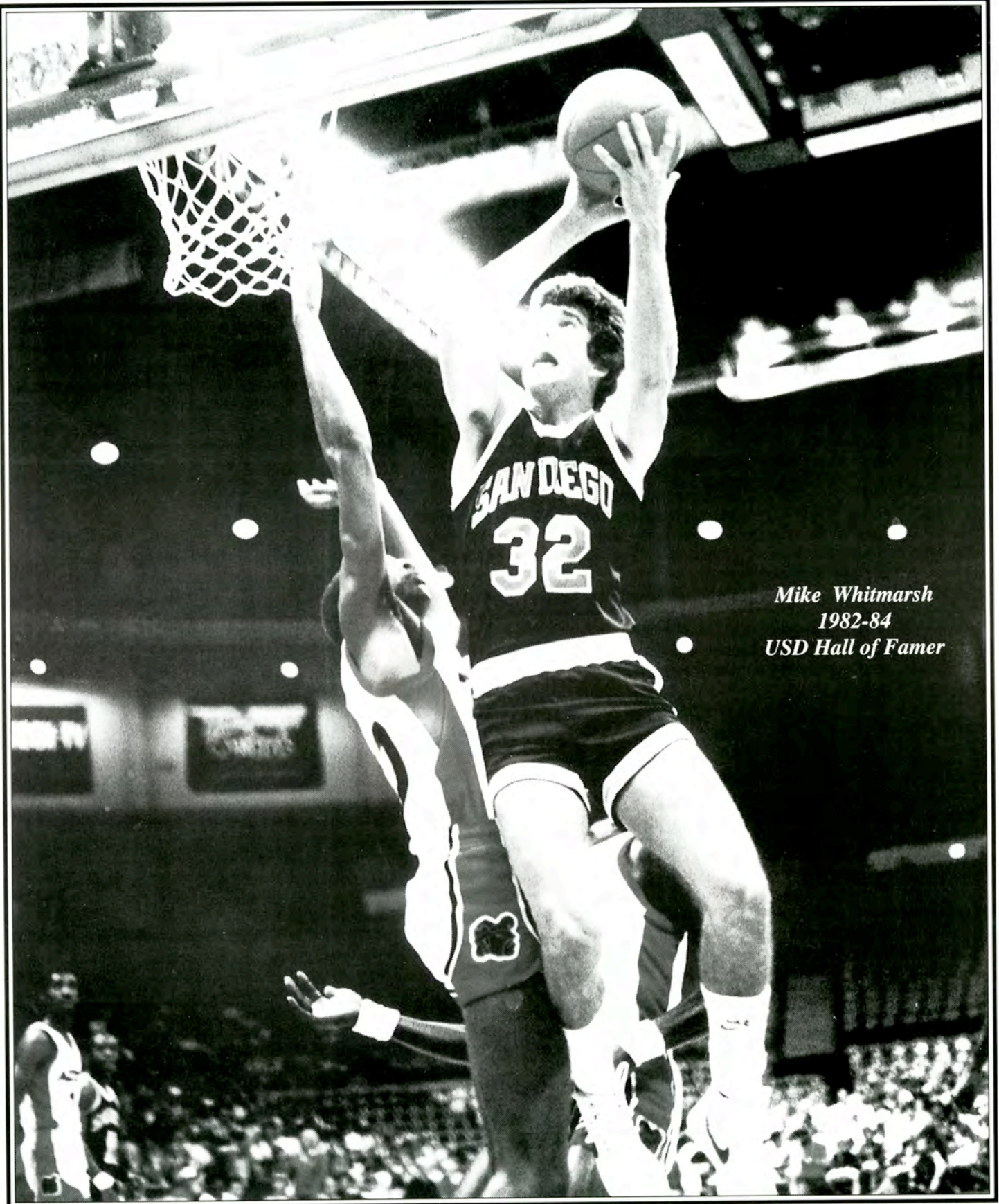
Student activities include cultural events, dances, boat cruises, beach parties, BBQ's, concerts, comedy nights, symposia and much more. Students participate in a wide range of volunteer projects such as adult literacy tutoring, senior citizen outreach, and house building in Tijuana. The intramural program is also an integral part of student life at USD with over two-thirds of the USD community partaking in intramural sports.

Did You Know?

- The University of San Diego was selected by the John Templeton Foundation for its 1997-98 Honor Roll of Character-Building Colleges. The honor roll recognizes 135 four-year accredited undergraduate institutions that emphasize character building an integral part of the college experience. Foundation officials made special mention of USD's "Ethics Across the Curriculum," a campus-wide initiative funded with a two-year, \$138,000 grant from the E.L. Wiegand Foundation. USD is one of eight California colleges and universities named to the honor roll.

ATHLETICS

USD is a member of the West Coast Conference for nearly all sports and competes in 16 intercollegiate sports on the NCAA Division I level. The football team completed its sixth season in the Pioneer Football League. Women's sports include: basketball, crew, cross country, soccer, softball, swimming, tennis and volleyball. Men's sports include: baseball, basketball, crew, cross country, golf, football, soccer and tennis. Since 1990 USD teams have won 5 conference championships; made 19 post-season appearances; had 16 Conference Coaches of the Year; 10 Conference Players of the Year; 10 Conference Freshman of the Year; 3 WCC Scholar Athletes of the Year; and 18 NCAA All-Americans. Zuzana Lesenarova, a two-time NCAA All-American for women's tennis, already has won the first two legs of the Collegiate Grand Slam this fall with wins at the Clay Courts and Riviera All-American.

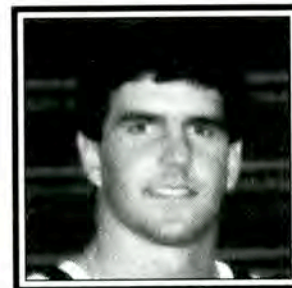

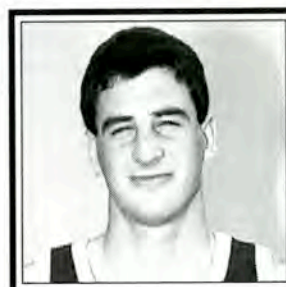

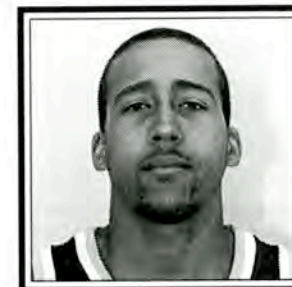

When the West Coast Conference first got its start back in 1952, the founders really had only one goal in mind ... to create a convenient way for five Bay Area schools to play basketball. What has grown from that original vision some 45 years ago is a marvelously cohesive athletics league which is competitive at the national level in 13 sports.

The eight current members of the WCC span the western coast of the United States from Canada to Mexico. Through the institutions range from the pine forests of eastern Washington state to the sun drenched beaches of southern California, the combined excellence in athletics and academics sets the conference apart on the national scene and draws the individual institutions together in a common mission.

The WCC sponsors championships in baseball, men's and women's basketball, men's and women's cross country, men's and women's golf, men's and women's soccer, men's and women's tennis, women's rowing, and women's volleyball. Women's rowing and golf were new championship sports added for the 1996-97 season.

Each year since 1989 the WCC has advanced at least one team to a national championship semifinal. All totaled, the WCC owns 31 team and individual national championships with the 1997 Pepperdine's men's golf team's NCAA title the most recent. Last season the USD volleyball team advanced

to the NCAA Tournament for the third time in five years; and the USD women's tennis team advanced for the eighth time since 1989. USD owns a total of seven WCC championships — men's basketball (1984, 1987), men's tennis (1989, 1990), men's soccer (1992, 1995) and women's volleyball (1997).

The league was chartered by five Bay Area institutions (San Francisco, Saint Mary's, Santa Clara, San Jose State and Pacific) as the California Basketball Association, playing its first game on January 2, 1953. After two seasons of play under that name, the conference expanded to include Loyola Marymount and Pepperdine in 1955, and became the "West Coast Athletic Conference" in 1956. The name was shortened to "West Coast Conference" in 1989.

The current alignment of Gonzaga, Loyola Marymount, Pepperdine, Portland, Saint Mary's, **San Diego**, San Francisco and

Santa Clara has remained unchanged since 1979, making the WCC the third most stable conference in the nation. Only the Ivy League and Pacific-10 Conference have been together longer.

All-time membership includes the following schools — Saint Mary's (45 years), Santa Clara (45), San Francisco (45), Loyola Marymount (42), Pepperdine (42), Portland (21), Pacific (19), **SAN DIEGO (18)**, Gonzaga (18), San Jose State (17), Nevada (10), Seattle (9), UNLV (6), UC Santa Barbara (5) and Fresno State (2).

With a donation of \$7 million by Sid and Jenny Craig, the University of San Diego received the lead gift necessary to proceed with planning its much needed \$17 million Sports/Activities Center. The building design is near completion and the fund raising campaign to raise the balance required has begun.

The pavilion, which will be located at the eastern end of campus between Torero Stadium and Cunningham Baseball Field, will include a 5,000-seat gymnasium, coaches offices, fitness center and athletic training facilities, showers and locker rooms, concession stand, and reception room. The Monsignor I.B. Eagen Plaza off the Pavilion entry, will take advantage of the view across campus to the ocean. The USD Athletic Hall of Fame will also be housed in the facility.

"The Jenny Craig Pavilion is vital to the quality of life on campus," said Tom Iannacone, USD Director of Athletics.

"It will have a positive and historical impact on many generations of students. It will also allow us to pursue championship venues for men's and women's basketball, and women's volleyball."

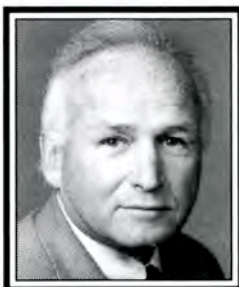

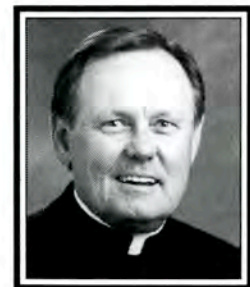

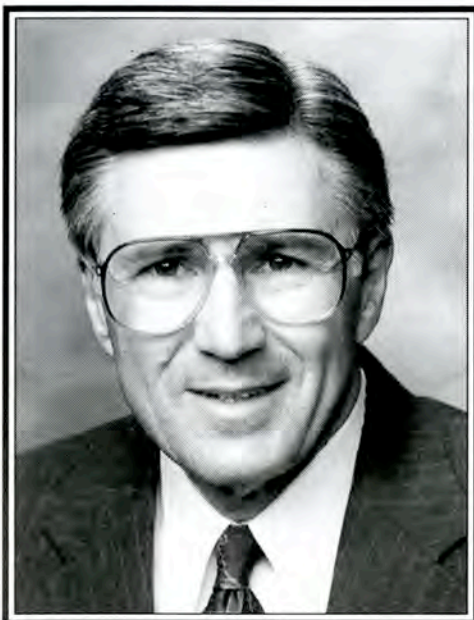

TOM IANNAZONE **Director of Athletics**



Tom Iannacone is in his eleventh year as Director of Athletics at the University of San Diego. He was named Director of Athletics on September 1, 1988 after holding the same position the previous four years at St. Francis College of Pennsylvania.

At USD, Iannacone directs an Athletic Department that includes sixteen NCAA Division I intercollegiate varsity teams, eight men's and eight women's, plus intramurals and recreation.

In the last ten years behind his direction and leadership, Torero Athletics has enjoyed successes both on and off the playing field. His accomplishments at USD include an internal reorganization of the athletic department, plus improvements in the major areas of personnel, scholarship assistance, facilities, promotions and marketing, fund raising, drug education, academic support, and a university approved plan for scholarship support and sports sponsorship. In addition, he was instrumental in USD gaining membership to the Pioneer Football League, which began play in 1993. He is a member of the I-AA Athletic Directors Association Executive Committee; and is past Chairman of the West Coast Conference Athletics Directors Committee.

During Iannacone's tenure, facilities at the USD Sports Center, along with all athletic fields, have seen vast improvements. Improvements at the Sports Center include complete renovations of both the north and south wings that added offices for administrators and coaches; additional locker rooms for women's basketball, volleyball and women's soccer; an athletic department conference room; and an academic support room. Torero Stadium, where football, men's and women's soccer compete, was widened to accommodate soccer, and added a state-of-the-art lighting system and scoreboard. The Softball Complex has benefitted with a scoreboard, new dugouts and batting cages. Additionally, The Canyon Field received lighting for intercollegiate practices and intramural use. The university is currently in its second year of its Capital Campaign for the Jenny Craig Pavilion, a new 5,000 seat multi-purpose facility that will be home for USD basketball and volleyball, and benefit the entire university community.

On the playing fields, USD has sent twenty-one teams to NCAA Tournaments since Iannacone's arrival in the Fall of 1988. Additionally, the school has captured six conference championships; twenty NCAA All-Americans; fifteen CoSIDA/GTE Academic All-Americans; sixteen conference Coaches of the Year; ten conference Players of the Year; and three West Coast Conference Scholar-Athletes of the Year. Since '88 the university has been the host site for NCAA Tournament events for women's volleyball, men's soccer and women's tennis.

Prior to USD, Iannacone built an impressive list of credentials at St. Francis College as Director of Athletics between 1984-87. His major contributions included the expansion of sports offerings and scholarships for both men and women, improved budgets, renovation of athletic facilities, the hiring of additional staff, and the establishment of a master plan for the future and continual development of athletics. He served on several committees, most notably the Eastern Collegiate Athletic Conference (ECAC) Infractions committee and the Northeast Conference committee on conference development.

He served as assistant Director of Athletics at Fordham University between 1977-84. Along with his administrative duties, he was assistant football coach for the Rams. Between 1975-78, he acted as offensive coordinator and backfield coach as Fordham captured 19 victories in their final 24 games during this span. The '77 squad was and remains the highest scoring team in Fordham history, averaging 34 points per game. In 1983 he was presented the prestigious Jack Coffey Award by the Alumni Association for his outstanding contributions to Fordham athletics. He also served on various Metro Atlantic Athletic Conference committees.

Prior to Fordham, Iannacone taught physical education and coached track and field, and football in Connecticut Public School Districts from 1964-76. He made his collegiate football coaching debut as an offensive backfield coach at Western Connecticut State University in 1974. A 1964 graduate of the University of Connecticut, Iannacone received his master of science degree in physical education from Southern Connecticut State University in 1973.

San Diego's location makes it an ideal destination. One can sail, swim, surf, scuba dive, snorkel and wind surf on miles of public beach or golf at any of the over 80 golf courses throughout the county. There are also miles of scenic jogging, hiking and biking trails. Sports spectators can take in professional, collegiate and amateur sports events. NFL Football, Major League Baseball, minor league ice hockey, championship golf, including the Buick Invitational at Torrey Pines, and thoroughbred horse racing are among the many events to be enjoyed in San Diego. The ARCO Olympic Training Center in San Diego's South Bay area is the nation's first year-round multisport training facility for Olympic athletes. In 1998, San Diego hosted Super Bowl XXXII and the World Series at Qualcomm Stadium.
