- Facilitate use of representative samples (Peterson, 2001)





- What I now do: Family Project worker at Barnardo's children's charity.
- My Maxi Project: whether well-being and self-esteem were affected by educational surroundings (playground, classroom and natural green space area)
 - self-esteem and enjoyment significantly increase in nature.
- Engaged in activities during study:
 - Meetings with school staff/community partner to organise study
 - Introducing children to research and study
 - Lead data collection with assistance from teachers
 - Presented findings and awarded certificates to children for participating.
 - Presented study at University and National (BPS undergraduate)
 conferences.



Impact of my final year project

- Supporting previous final year students allowed me to access area myself when it was my time to complete study.
- Having participants away from university students allowed me to apply my study to the real world.
