Presidential honors are already being planted, but the season is young yet and any little tender shoots may be frosted before the real heat of the campaign gets in.

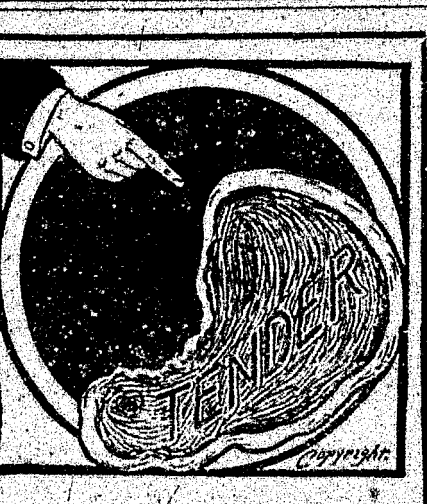
