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This Quick Guide provides key internet links to information about:

General resources

- The <u>Australian Qualifications Framework</u> is the national policy for regulated qualifications in Australian
 education and training. It incorporates the qualifications from each education and training sector into a single
 comprehensive national qualifications framework.
- The <u>Standing Council on Tertiary Education</u>, <u>Skills and Employment (SCOTESE)</u> is the COAG committee with high-level policy responsibility for:
 - higher education
 - VET, including skills and workforce development
 - international education
 - adult and community education and
 - employment.
- <u>Study Assist</u> has information on Australian Government financial assistance available to tertiary education students.

Higher education

- The <u>Department of Education</u> has responsibility for higher education. At the time of writing, information about Australian Government higher education policies and programs is still located on the <u>Department of Industry</u> website. It includes an <u>overview</u> of Australia's higher education system and the latest news on government programs through the <u>Higher Education 2020 Newsletter</u>.
- The Tertiary Education Quality and Standards Agency (TEQSA) is the national regulator for higher education.
- The <u>Higher Education Report</u> is an annual report on programs, funding and statistics. The latest edition is 2010.
- Universities Australia provides a profile of each university and links to university websites.
- MyUniversity provides students with a broad range of information about Australian universities and other higher education providers.
- <u>Australia University Rankings</u> includes details of the major international rankings and the Excellence in Research for Australia (ERA) rankings.
- <u>Hobsons Course Finder</u> provides university and course rankings from *The Good Universities Guide*, as well as facilities to search for courses by a range of criteria.
- The <u>Higher Education Support Act 2003 (HESA)</u> provides the legislative framework for funding higher education institutions and providing loans to students.

Key organisations

- <u>Universities Australia</u> is the national representative body for Australian universities. This website contains useful links, policy documents and statistics.
- There are four sub-groups of Australian universities:
 - the <u>Group of Eight</u> (Go8) is a coalition of established universities, intensive in research and comprehensive in general and professional education
 - the Australian Technology Network (ATN) is an alliance of five universities with strong links to industry
 - the <u>Innovative Research Universities</u> (IRU) is a group of seven comprehensive universities with a research focus and
 - the <u>Regional Universities Network</u> (RUN) is a group of six universities with headquarters in regional Australia.
- The National Tertiary Education Union represents employees in the tertiary education sector.
- The National Union of Students is the national representative body for university students.
- The <u>Council of Australian Postgraduate Associations</u> aims to protect and further the interests of postgraduate students.

- The Australian Government's <u>Higher Education Statistics Collection</u> includes current and time series data on university finances, students and staff.
- <u>Graduate Careers Australia</u> conducts research into the outcomes and experiences of higher education students and graduates including graduate employment and earnings.

- Australian Tertiary Admissions Rank (ATAR cut-off scores are available for some states: New South
 <u>Wales</u> (includes the Australian Capital Territory), <u>Victoria</u> (have to search by course), <u>South Australia</u> (see
 <u>Universities Semester 1,Table X, 'Year 12 cut-off scores'</u>) and <u>Western Australia</u>.

Vocational education and training

- The <u>Department of Industry</u> has responsibility for VET and its website provides access to information about Australian Government VET policies and programs. The information includes an <u>overview</u> of the major policies and frameworks in the VET sector.
- The <u>Annual National Report of the Australian Vocational Education and Training System</u> includes an overview of the national VET system, an analysis of the system's performance and key statistics, and a summary of Australian, state and territory government developments.
- The annual <u>Report on Government Services</u>, published by the Productivity Commission, provides an overview of the VET system, key statistics and funding information.
- The <u>Intergovernmental Agreement on Federal Financial Relations (IGA)</u>, agreed to by the Council of Australian Governments, provides for the Australian Government's National Skills and Workforce Development Specific Purpose Payment (SPP).
- The <u>National Agreement for Skills and Workforce Development</u> (NASWD), formulated as part of the IGA, defines the objectives, outcomes, outputs and performance measures and the roles and responsibilities that guide the Australian and the state and territory governments in the delivery of services across the skills and workforce development sector.
- The annual <u>National Agreement for Skills and Workforce Development: performance report</u> is a report on governments' progress against the agreed objectives and outcomes of the NASWD.
- There are two National Partnerships associated with the NAWSD—the <u>National Partnership Agreement on</u> Skills Reform and the National Partnership Agreement on Youth Attainment and Transitions.
- The <u>Australian Skills Quality Authority</u> is the national regulator for Australia's vocational education and training sector.
- <u>training.gov.au</u> is the official national register of information on training packages, qualifications, courses, units of competency and Registered Training Organisations.
- <u>Australian Apprenticeships</u> provides information on the Australian Government's programs to support apprenticeships and traineeships.
- My Skills has a range of information about training options and providers, and includes statistics on student enrolments and outcomes.
