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Michigan Bell To Expand In Holland

Michigan Bell Telephone Company plans to spend \$1,168,000 for new construction to expand and improve service in Holland during 1959 and 1960, the company announced today.

Andrew G. Sall, Michigan Bell Manager here, said the company will spend \$482,000 this year and \$686,000 next year.

The outlays, when added to the 1958-1959 expenditures, will bring Holland's total to more than \$2.2 million for the five-year period.

The \$1,168,000 earmarked for Holland is part of the \$171 million construction program Michigan Bell has planned throughout its territory for 1959 and 1960.

Michigan Bell recently outlined the statewide program in general terms before the Public Service Commission in Lansing. The company, in hearings on its application for a rate increase, said it planned to spend nearly \$79 million in its territory this year and nearly \$92 million next year. The 1960 outlay will be second only to the company's record \$105 million construction program in 1957.

"The 1959-60 expenditures," Sall said, "represent the company's best estimate as to what will be required to fill customer demand for better grades of service, to place in effect many of the technological advances which have been developed to make telephone service more convenient and useful, and to provide service to customers when and where they want it."

"A program of this magnitude means much to the economy of Michigan," Sall said.

Adams Promises Statement Soon on Allegan Investigation

ALLEGAN (Special) — At the conclusion of an hour-long conference with former undersheriff Robert Whitcomb and his attorney, Chester Ray, state Attorney General Paul Adams agreed this week that he would issue a public statement within two weeks on the findings of an eight-week investigation into allegations of wrong doing in the Allegan police and county sheriff's department.

Regarding Whitcomb's demand that criminal proceedings be started against him so he would have a chance to clear his name, Adams said he couldn't do anything at this time because the investigation is not complete.

Whitcomb told Adams, "I am innocent of any crime and I can't understand why it is taking so long for your investigators to find this out."

Ray told Adams he could not understand how the two state investigators could spend eight

weeks in Allegan and bring forth nothing. He added that he considered the investigation unfair especially because Adams' office continues to give out press releases which infer that something serious is going to happen.

Adams denied that he had made any statements to the press about the investigation and Ray replied that "it is obvious you do not have enough information on the case to do so."

Ray charged that the investigation already has shown Whitcomb innocent of any crime and pointed out that the former deputy had been badly hurt by the charges. Ray told Adams "You can't prosecute him, why don't you have the good grace to clear him?"

Adams replied that when the investigation is complete he wants to be in the position of being able to say with certainty that no evidence of wrongdoing had been unearthed.

Bids Opened On Equipment For New Plant

Some 30 firms submitted bids on approximately \$800,000 worth of electrical equipment for the new light plant addition Tuesday in the city hall council chambers.

Equipment bidden upon today included various sizes and types of pumps, air compressors, water heaters, deaerators, coolers, evaporators, a service elevator, a coal handling system, traveling screens, control and instrument equipment and other electrical items.

Consulting Engineers Black and Veatch of Kansas City, Mo., have taken the bids under examination and appraisal, and are expected to make their recommendations to the Board of Public Works in about two weeks.

Randall C. Bosch, president of the BPW, presided. Also present were vice president Adrian Klaasen, board members Henry S. Maentz, Donald Vink and William DeLong, Superintendent Buy Bell, City Manager Herb Holt, Roy Gore and Marvin Fink of Black and Veatch and about 35 manufacturers' representatives.

In the largest single bidding, covering six separate items of major electrical equipment, Westinghouse Corp. submitted the low total bid of \$237,260. Allis Chalmers followed closely with a total bid of \$238,298, and General Electric submitted a total bid of \$239,847.

Spring Lake Okays Millage

SPRING LAKE (Special) — Spring Lake school district voters approved, 762-387, a proposal for a 2 1/2 mill school tax increase Tuesday and the measure will give the district approximately \$39,000 additional for school operating expenses.

It was the second time in four months that the district voters had considered the issue. A proposal for a 3-mill tax raise was defeated at a special election March 17, 501-257.

The approval Tuesday followed several moves made here by interested factions. Following the defeat in March, the Spring Lake school board came out with a 14-point austerity program because of the lack of funds. This included discontinuing bus transportation, reverting teachers' salaries, eliminating interscholastic athletics and limiting the band program.

Since the issue passed, it is expected that these programs plus the other phases of the school program previously altered will be restored. A Spring Lake School study group was formed and a citizens committee was organized in March and after study recommended another millage election.

Grand Haven School Tax Will Drop 1.3 Mills

GRAND HAVEN (Special) — The total tax levy in the Grand Haven school district will drop 1.3 mills during the 1959-60 school year, it was noted at the regular session of the Grand Haven Board of Education Monday.

The amount levied during 1958-59 school year was 18.72 as compared to the current figure 17.42. The amount to be levied for the 1959-60 debt represents \$225,615.

Supt. Ralph Van Volkinburg stated it is possible this levy will complete the 1959 bond indebtedness, but it will depend upon percentage of taxes collected in January, 1960. The total bond levy for the Senior High School in 1959 was for \$1,600,000.

Adams Turns Down Request From Hoffman

LANSING — Attorney Gen. Paul L. Adams has refused to start court action on behalf of Allegan County residents to nullify annexation to Holland approved in an election June 5, 1958.

John H. Schurman and others failed in a Circuit Court bid to have the annexation set aside. A Supreme Court ruling upheld the denial.

The courts said the action to set aside the annexation was not started within 30 days of the annexation election as required by law.

Adams may start action to overrule annexation at any time, but he said the "clear position of the (Supreme) Court in the case" prevented him from doing so.

The annexed territory includes most of Maplewood school district.

A bid by the school district to force parts of the district outside Holland to annex to an Allegan County district was recently turned down by the State Board of Education. The school district wanted to become eligible to annex to the Holland school district.

In a letter to Leo W. Hoffman, Allegan attorney for the Schurman group, Adams said it was still possible to petition for an election to dis-annex from the city.

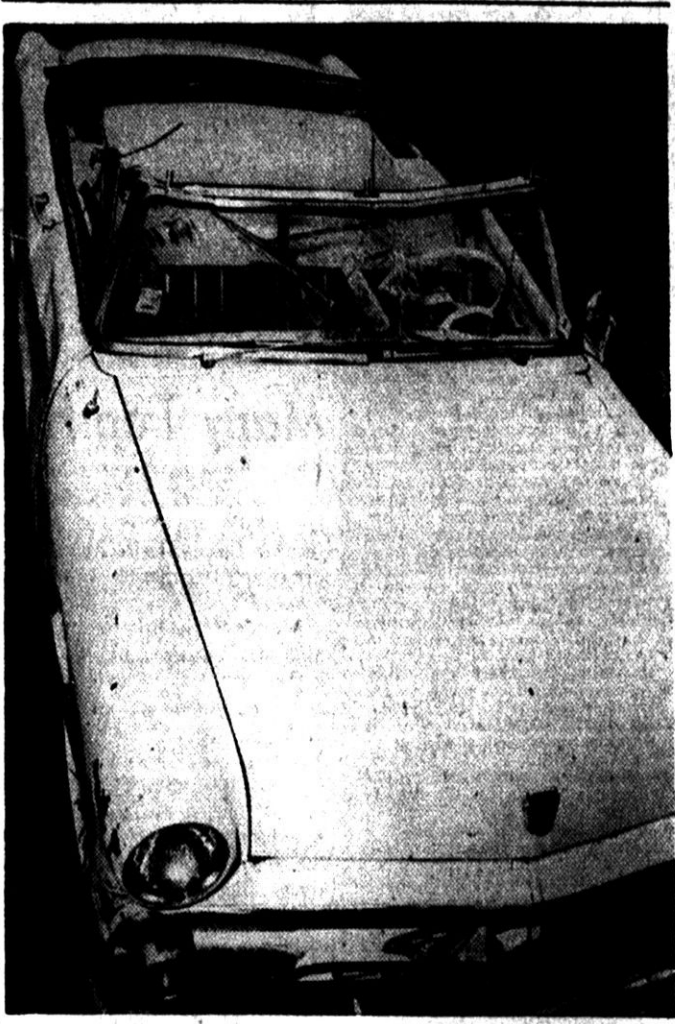
Miles is a member of the Willard G. Leenhouts Post No. 6 of Holland and has been active in Legion circles.

1 Injured, 3 Not Hurt As Car Tips

Barbara A. Bradford, 20, Pronounced Dead On Arrival at Hospital

A 20-year-old Chicago girl, a long-time summer resident of Macatawa Park, early today was killed when the convertible automobile in which she was riding, rolled over off the road and pinned her underneath, on 66th St. just south of 144th Ave., near Holt's Lake.

The victim was Barbara Adele Bradford, of 651 Lakeside Rd., Macatawa Park, and 7214 South Shore Dr., Chicago.

Medical Examiner Dr. William Westrate Jr. said death was caused by suffocation.

The driver of the car, James M. Larkin, 18, of Chicago, was treated at Holland Hospital for a bruised right arm and discharged after being pinned briefly under the car.

Three other occupants of the car, True Elizabeth McDonald, 20, of Grand Rapids, Thomas Swanson, 19, of Chicago, and Anthony Buterfield, 28, of Jackson, were thrown clear as the car turned over, and were not hurt.

Allegan County Deputy Con Zeedyk, said the accident happened at 1 a.m. as Larkin, headed northeast on 66th St., lost control as he approached a sharp curve on the sandy gravel road.

Larkin told officers he had not seen the curve ahead, and slammed on the brakes. Officers said they measured 42 feet of skid marks in the sand at the side of the road, and another 47 feet of skid marks off the road before the car tipped over. Miss Bradford was riding in the front seat beside Larkin.

Swanson ran a quarter of a mile to a farmhouse and called an ambulance and deputies. Zeedyk, on the way to the scene, radioed for aid and Saugatuck Police Chief Russell Colling and Officer Robert Platt answered.

The three officers used a fence post to pry the car off Miss Bradford, Colling said she was lying face down, pinned against the earth by the front seat. She was rushed to Holland Hospital, but pronounced dead on arrival at 1:45 a.m.

Colling said he and Deputy Zeedyk this evening will confer with Allegan County Prosecutor Ervin Andrews on possible charges to be placed against Larkin.

Miss Bradford, a junior at the University of Wisconsin, is survived by her parents, Mr. and Mrs. Charles L. Bradford, of Chicago; two brothers, Charles L. Jr. and Richard S.; two sisters, Linda Ann and Marion R.; and a grandmother, Mrs. Marion L. Bradford of Holland. The victim was the niece of Mr. and Mrs. William J. Bradford of Holland.

Funeral services will be held Saturday at 1:30 p.m. from the Ver Lee-Geenen Funeral Home, followed by a 2 p.m. service at the Grace Episcopal Church with the Rev. Verne Hohl officiating. Burial will be in Pilgrim Home Cemetery.

The body is at the Ver Lee-Geenen Funeral Home, where relatives and friends may meet the family Friday from 7 to 9 p.m.

Lake Odessa Man Pleads Guilty to Drug Charge

ALLEGAN July 22 — Armanda Vasquez, 21, Lake Odessa pleaded guilty before Circuit Court Judge Raymond L. Smith on a charge of being in possession of narcotics, in violation of the state narcotics law. His bond of \$10,000 remains the same and he is being held in Allegan County jail. Sentencing will be August 14.

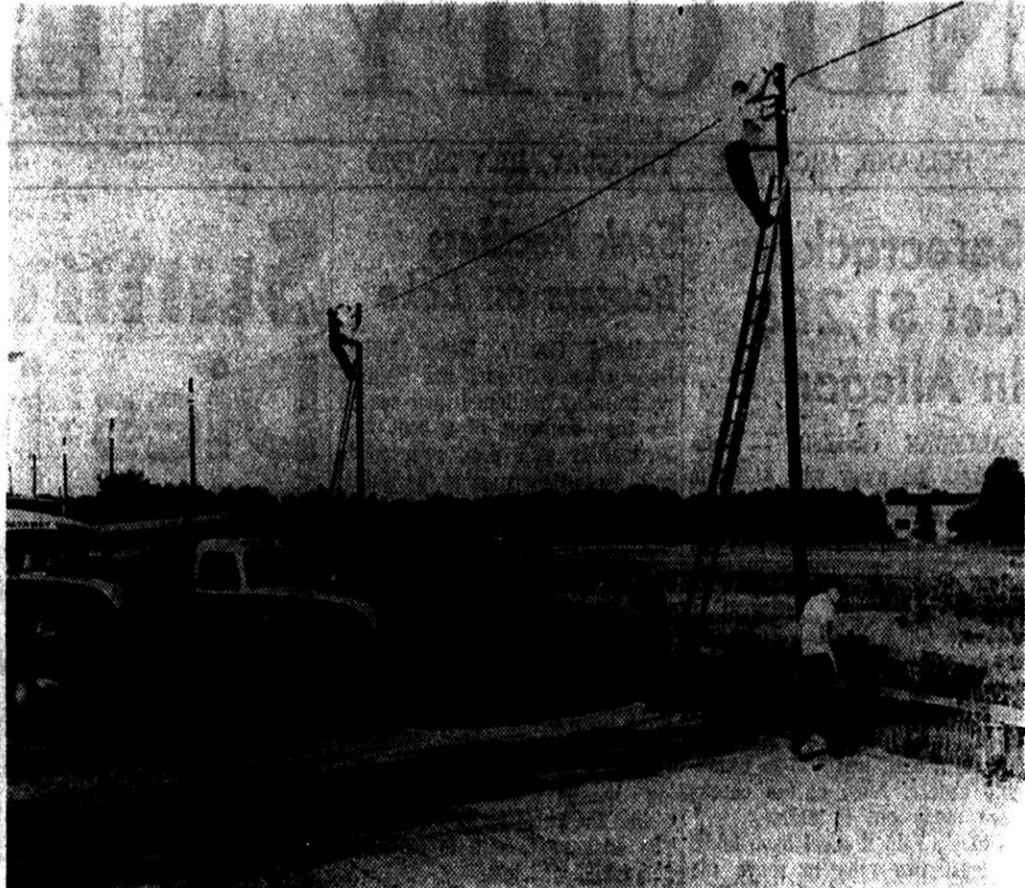

Many Top Harness Horses to Race Here

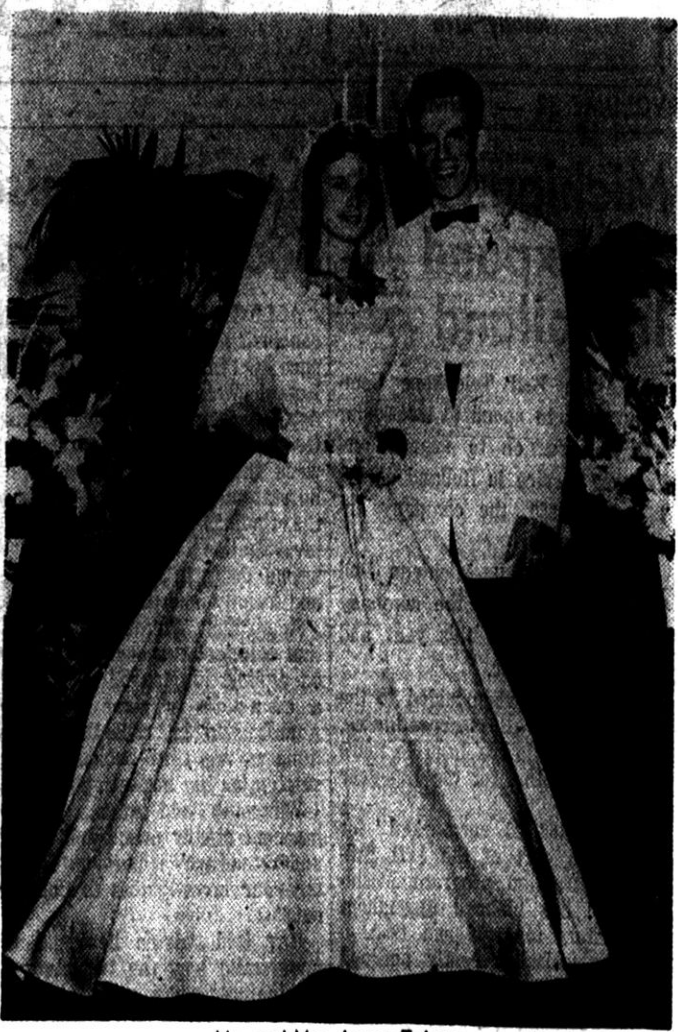

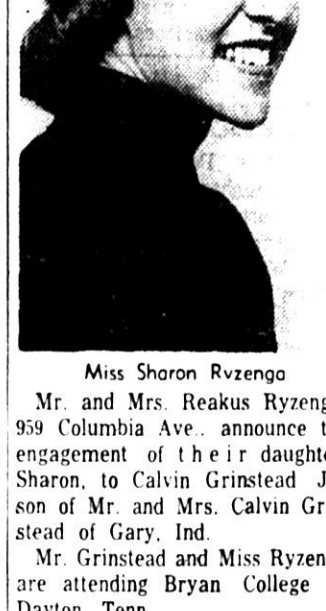

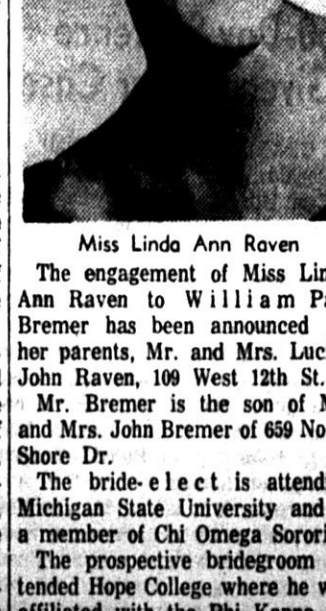

Holland Motor Gets Honor Award

For the second consecutive year Holland Motor Express, Inc. has received a certificate of merit from the American Trucking Association in recognition of the company's achievement in preventing losses and claims.

The company's claim ratio in 1958 was .59 or, approximately 1/2 of 1 per cent of total freight revenue which amounted to some \$4,091,565. The national figure, averaged for the entire industry, is 1.15, or nearly double the Holland Motor Express ratio.

Charles Cooper, president, said the company's 1958 record was especially significant because it represented an improvement of .03 over 1957 when the loss ratio was an award-winning 62 on a total revenue of \$3,933,914.

"In other words," he pointed out, "although we handled a greater dollar volume of freight in 1958 than in 1957, our claim ratio was less."

Cooper credited the company's continuing program of employee education for the new record. Training and discussion sessions on the proper handling of freight and equipment are conducted regularly at each of the firm's 14 terminals in Michigan, Ohio, Indiana, Kentucky, and Illinois by Verne Fuder, manager of customer service.

Posters, bulletins, charts, and other materials used by Fuder at these meetings were exhibited at the national ATA convention in Detroit in June. Their content and effectiveness were taken into consideration in awarding certificates of merit which were presented to only 71 trucking companies out of a total ATA membership of 3,000 common carriers.

Promptness of claim settlement when losses do occur also was a factor in the ATA competition. Holland Motor Express scored high in this respect. Cooper stated that 90 per cent of claims against Holland Motor Express are settled the day they are received.

The certificate was awarded through the National Freight Claim Council of ATA and is signed by J. Robert Cooper, president of ATA and president of Red Star Transit Lines, Detroit.

Ball's Feat 50 Years Ago

The late Neal Ball, who played with the Holland Independents in 1900, 1901 and 1902, made the first unassisted triple play in the major leagues 50 years ago Sunday.

Ball, playing shortstop with Cleveland, accomplished the feat on July 19, 1909. The play took place in the second inning. Runners were on second and first after successive singles and they took off as the ball was lined to Ball. He ran over and touched second and then outtraced the runner trying to get back to first.

Ball also hit a home run and double in the game which Cleveland won, 6-1. He died Oct. 16, 1957 in Bridgeport, Conn., at age 76.

While in Holland, Ball pitched and helped Holland win the state championship. He started playing ball in Holland when he was 19. The late Nap Lajoie of Cleveland saw Ball pitch against the American League All-Stars and that started his major league career.

Ball was beaten in that game, 2-1 and Lajoie, the Hall of Fame second baseman, congratulated Ball and said "Young man today you pitched your way into the American League."

Because of his hitting and fielding, Ball was later made a shortstop and second baseman. He played in the majors with Cleveland, Boston and New York. His unassisted triple play held for years until it was duplicated in a World Series game. The glove Ball was wearing when he made the play has been enshrined in the Hall of Fame in Cooperstown, N.Y.

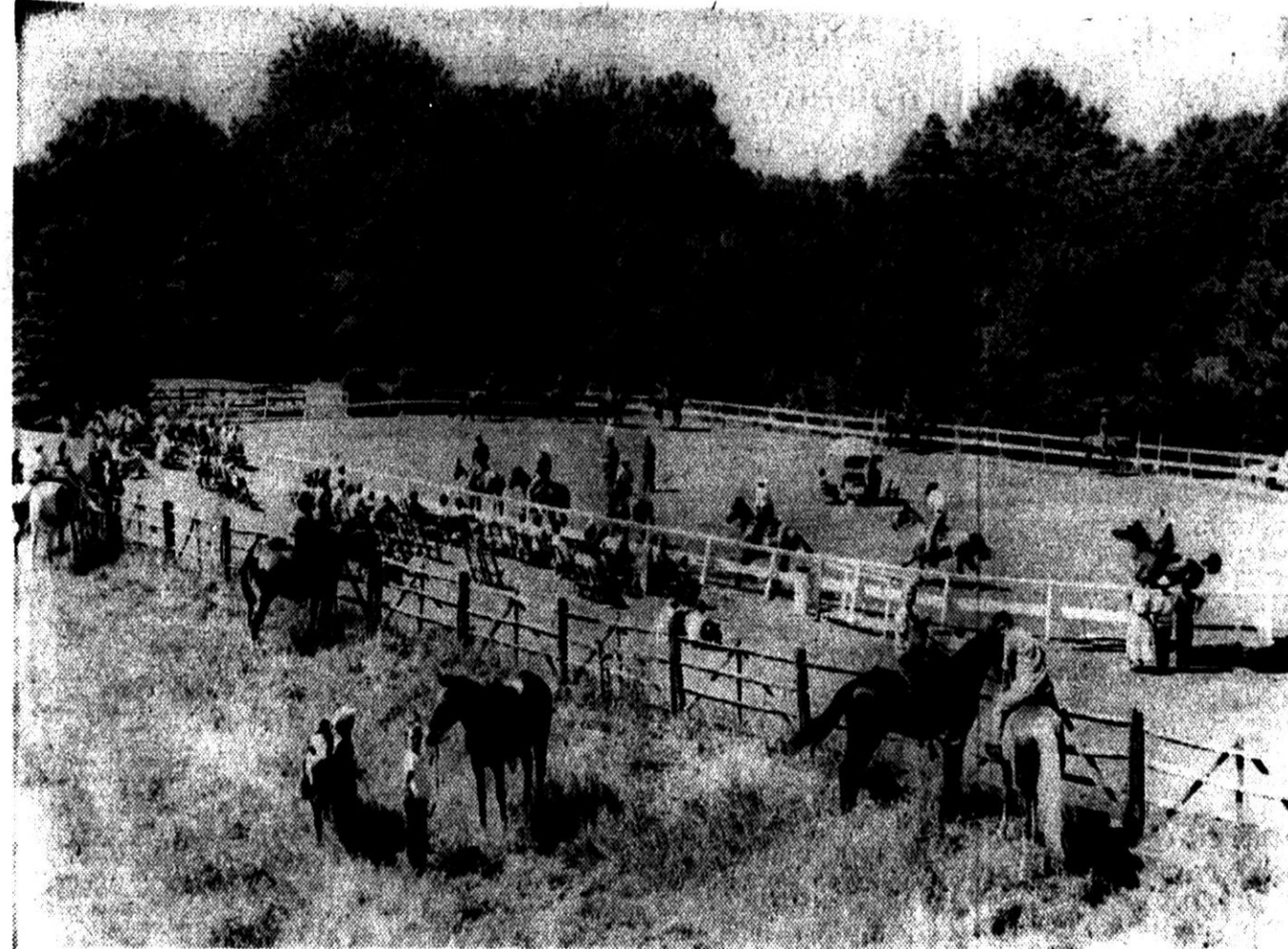

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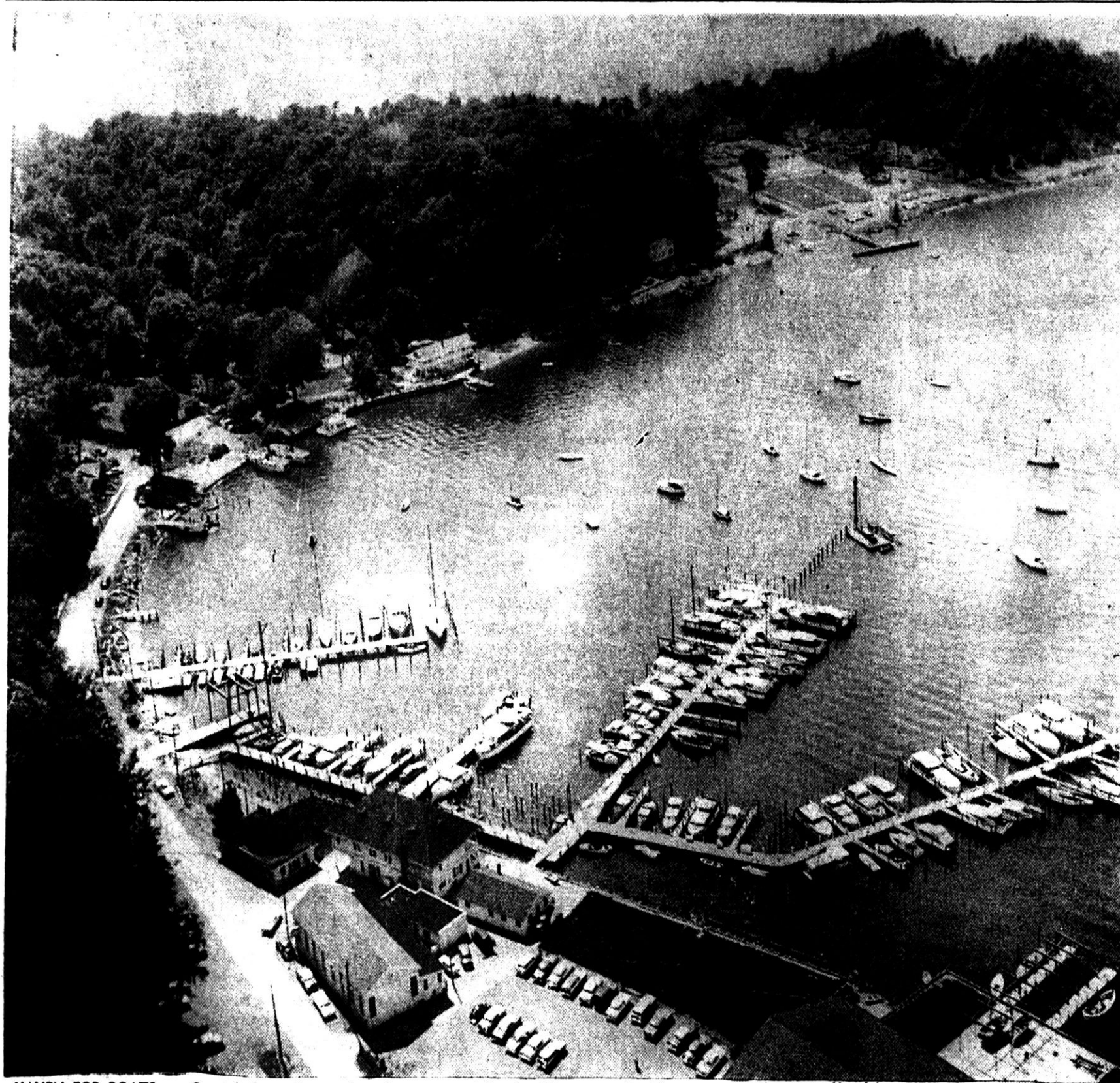

Saugatuck Authorities Jail Youth for Failing to Leave Town

ALLEGAN (Special) — Julius Zabede was released from a 60-day sentence in Allegan County jail Thursday by Sheriff Walter Runkel when he was informed by Prosecuting Attorney Ervin Andrews that he had no authority to hold the youth.

Seventeen-year-old Zabede of New York City, a clerk in a Saugatuck gift shop, was taken to the jail by village police after he failed to "get out of Saugatuck immediately."

The order to leave town was part of a unique sentence handed down by Saugatuck Justice of the Peace Harry Bobsin after the boy pleaded guilty to a disorderly charge.

Zabede, who told his attorneys, Lewis Chappell and Harold Neale of South Haven, that he had pleaded guilty rather than spend two months in jail awaiting trial, was sentenced to pay a \$25 fine, \$3.40 costs and serve sixty days in the county jail. Bobsin added that he would suspend the sentence if Zabede left town immediately.

The youth was arrested on the complaint of a young woman who was a customer in the Saugatuck gift shop where Zabede worked. The youth admired the woman's handbag and jokingly offered to buy it from her for \$50. When she indicated she would sell it to him he quickly withdrew the offer. Later she returned to the store and charged that Zabede had taken something from her handbag when he was examining it. He denied the accusation.

Justice of the Peace Leslie Junkerman told the young woman she didn't have enough evidence to bring charges. Justin Bobsin issued a warrant and Zabede was arrested Tuesday, by Saugatuck police. When arraigned before Bobsin, Zabede indicated he would not plead guilty to the disorderly charge and the justice answered that he would set bond at \$1,000, adding that if the youth couldn't post the bond he would be taken to the county jail to await trial, which he said "probably wouldn't be until September." Saugatuck police told the youth that pleading guilty would be the "easiest way out."

Zabede told his attorneys that he decided to plead guilty when the officers indicated there would only be a nominal fee of \$25 if he pleaded guilty.

Zabede was given until 3 Wednesday afternoon to leave Saugatuck and police officers returned to the gift shop around 5 p.m. to make sure the youth had left. Accompanied by Bobsin, they demanded that Walter Towel, operator of the shop, allow them to search the building.

When Towel refused, attorneys said, they ordered customers from the store and locked it. They placed Towel under arrest on a charge of "aiding and abetting" and held him for two hours in the village jail. When he refused to give them a key to the upstairs apartment, they took a key from him. However, it was not the right key so officers broke into the apartment where they found Zabede.

Mr. Van't Hof concluded on a community counsel problem which is in its early phases at the Kent County Jail. The work is being done in co-operation with the churches and the ministers of the men's choosing.

West Ottawa Expects 2,172 Pupils in Fall

A total of 2,172 students, including 275 kindergartners, is the anticipated enrollment of the West Ottawa public school in September, Supt. Lloyd Van Raalte reported Monday night at the regular monthly meeting of the Board of Education in the Holland Township Fire station.

These students will be grades kindergarten through 10th grade. The census report was given by Van Raalte and showed 1,422 children under five which is a four per cent increase over 1958. The census showed a total of 3,013 school age children from five through 19. This is an increase of 4.7 per cent.

The projected enrollment was taken from the census and the actual school figures at the close of the spring semester. A total of 111 students are expected in the 10th grade and 144 in the ninth grade.

Gerrit Van Kampen, board president, submitted his resignation for health reasons. William Sanford was appointed to fill the vacancy and will serve until the next annual election in July, 1960. The board will hold a special meeting next Monday to elect a new president.

Contracts were approved for two new teachers. Mrs. Margaret Kibby of Holland will teach middle elementary and Mrs. Lois Sweet of Zeeland will teach lower elementary.

Van Raalte reported that the schools still must receive \$39,014.37 in state aid for the past year. The board also had a second reading on the custodial maintenance policy, including a salary schedule.

A total of 1,390 different pupils were transported by school bus last school year for a total of 84,000 miles. This was an average cost of \$20.80 per child, Van Raalte said.

West Olive and Robart schools showed significant decreases in enrollments for next fall and the board approved a plan to give less grades per teacher than in past years. This will make educational opportunity equalized throughout the district, Van Raalte said.

The children, playing in the water, stepped off a dropoff. Mrs. Thompson dove into the water and caught hold of Jimmy, but Melody slipped away. While a bystander called State police and deputies, swimming instructors Jane Byrne and Judy Thoma raced to the rescue.

Miss Byrne dove twice before finding Melody and bringing her in. Deputies said the child was blue when Miss Byrne began the artificial respiration taught in the Red Cross classes. After the child was revived, she was taken to Municipal Hospital for a checkup and released.

Macatawa Yacht Basin Tops With Great Lakes Sailors

The yacht basin at Macatawa and Jesieks Shipyards in particular are well-known to sailors on the Great Lakes as one of the best spots for boats in the entire lake region.

In 1910 A. W. Jesiek and Joseph Jesiek started as a boat rental agency. The shipyards have now grown to accommodate 150 boats in slips and 30 at anchorages. Throughout the summer boats from runabouts and outboards to 75-foot cruisers and sailboats mingle at the marina.

Familiar names like Hugh Schaddelee's "Hilaria" of Macatawa Bay Yacht Club, Nick Geib of Chicago and his "Kowloon," Spanier Brothers of Chicago and "Esbro"; Harvey Nedean of Muskegon and the "Ramahaja"; Carl Thompson's "Cirrus III" of Allegan; Charley Phelps' "Corvette" of MBYC.

Roger McCormick of Chicago keeps the "Aura" at Jesieks as does Vincent Lazzar of Chicago, the "Avante". During the winter many of these larger boats are in storage at the marina. There is storage space for about 220 boats.

The old MBYC clubhouse, which now serves as the office and marine store, was moved to the present location in 1934 by A. W. Jesiek. Storage sheds are the original buildings and are being added onto as the demand increases. The large new storage shed on the south side of the road was built in 1957 and 170 feet are being added now. Twelve new slips for 65-foot boats are under construction.

Gradually the old buildings have been torn down and replaced. The galley snack shack has been leased by Nick Hoffman, former Holland restaurant man, for the convenience of boat owners.

Don and Bill Jesiek operate the shipyard and their father A. W. Jesiek, still maintains an active interest. A third brother, the late Harold Jesiek, was an important part of the shipyard. About 15 mechanics and marine experts are employed full time with 22 employed during the spring.
