1966 Album Revolver

Story Behind the song

- Written by Paul McCartney
- About a lonely old woman
- Rigby is the name of a store
 - 'Father McKenzie' was going to be 'Father McCartney'
- Matching gravestone at the band's meeting place
 - Song arrangement possibly inspired by Vivaldi

Musical Elements

- Song arrangement possibly inspired by Vivaldi
- No drums or guitars
- Contains four violins, two violas and two Chellos
- Was never played live by the band

"Revolution" PEVOLUTION BY JOHN LEINING & PAUL MCGARTNEY



Year 1968

"Revolution" was a single paired with "Hey Jude". "Revolution 1" and "Revolution 9" are on the White album.

Story Behind the Song

- The Band's most well-known political song.
- John Lennon's response to the Vietnam war
- Original version says both "Count me in " and "Count me out".
- Final version says "Count me out".

Musical Elements:

- Recorded lying down for a different sound
- Scream at beginning recorded separately.
 Includes an organ, electric piano, and handclaps.
- "Revolution 1" has a slower tempo recorded in A major, more brass and

backup vocals.



1965 Album


Released as a single, paired with "Help"

Story Behind the Song

- Written at his girlfriend's house.
 A joking way of presenting their relationship problems.
- Musical Elements
- Inspired by Little Richard
- Includes bongos and a organ.

Sgt. Pepper's Lonely Hearts Club Band

Story Behind the Song

- Beginning about two local newspaper stories with John Lennon's own spin
- The middle part written by Paul McCartney, about his daily routine, was meant for another song.
- Some lines were banned due to drug references.
- 'I saw a film today, oh boy. The English army had just won the war' from Lennon's film *How I Won the War*.
- Title never mentioned in Lyrics.

Musical Elements

- Two musical styles integrated
 - Combined guitars and pianos with a forty-one piece orchestra
- Recorded in three sessions: basic track, the orchestra, and the last note
- The last chord was hit by all four Beatles, producer George Martin, and lasted over forty seconds.

1968 Album


Does not appear on a studio album, later appears on a mix album of the same name

Story behind the song

- Written by Paul McCartney, for John Lennon's son Jillian after his parents divorced
- Jillian learned the song was about him shortly before John's murder. •

 Musical Elements
- Basic musicality
- Consists of guitars and pianos
- Becomes more rock n' roll toward the end
- Vocals and instrumentation end in F natural.




Year 1964 Album Beatles for Sale

Story Behind the Song

- Written before Beatles, similar sounding version part of the Quarrymen
- Written by Paul McCartney at age sixteen.
- Inspired by looking outside, imagining traveling with the sun.
- Followed by "Mr. Moonlight" on the album.
 - Musical Elements
 - Folk-like sound
- Straightforward form, low pitch range
- C major key, very few chords present
- Chromatic lines present in bridge vocals

Year 1968 Album The White Album Story Behind the Song

- Written and recorded by Paul McCartney, shortly after the band's return from India.
- Another political song from the White Album, like "Revolution".
- About racism as well as the hope for freedom and equality.

Musical Elements

- Composed in E minor, a key McCartney and George Harrison learned at a young age.
- Time signature changes several times throughout the song, from 3/4, to 4/4 and 2/4.
- Instrumentation consists of only guitars and vocals.

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"Don't Let Me Down"



Year 1969 Album

Released as a single, along with "Get Back".

Story Behind the Song

Written by John Lennon, for his wife, Yoko Ono.

Played at their last concert, featured in the film Let it Be.

Covered by Jillian Lennon, Taylor Hicks, Maroon 5, and Matchbox Twenty.


Musical Elements

Keyboards played by Billy Preston, whom George Harrison brought in to smooth tensions within the band.

Symbols played by Ringo Starr.

Alternate take on the 2003 album Let it Be...Naked.

Revolver

Story Behind the Song

Written by Paul McCartney, about his desire for marijuana

Covered by Earth, Wind, & Fire

Used in the television show Golden Threat.

Musical Elements

- First time trumpets and saxophones were included in a Beatles song.
- One of John Lennon's favorite McCartney songs.
- Did not chart until 1976.

"Get Back" The Beatles GET BACK / DON'T LET ME DOWN

1970 Album Let it Be

Story Behind the Song

Originally about illegal immigration

Represents the band getting back to their old roots

Rumored to be about Yoko Ono, because he looked at her when performing the song

Musical Elements

- John Lennon claimed it to be a rewrite of "Lady Madonna"
- Piano played by Billy Preston
- Covered by Rod Stewart, Elton John, and the Bee Gees
