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

LIBRARY TO BE NAMED IN HONOR OF DR. PEAU

By unanimous approval of the CSU Board of Trustees Wednesday, the college Library will be named in honor of Dr. John M. Pfau. For President Pfau, the trustees waived a policy that requires a building not be named

until one year after the honoree's retirement. The action also marks the first time a building on this campus has been named for an individual.

The naming of the library was first proposed by the Associated Students, then supported by the Faculty Senate and the Alumni Association. A formal announcement will be made at the Friday, June 4 dinner honoring President Pfau, who is retiring in July after 20 years as president of Cal State, San Bernardino. Late reservations for the dinner will be accepted through Wednesday, June 2 by the office of the vice president for administration, Ext. 7411.

JUNE 19 COMMENCEMENT PROGRAM ANNOUNCED

Saturday, June 19 will mark the 16th commencement ceremony for this college and the 16th year President John M. Pfau has conferred degrees on graduates of Cal State, San Bernardino. So that each graduate will have the op-

portunity to come forward to receive congratulations from the president, the ceremony again will have no guest speaker.

The program will begin with the processional at 9 a.m. on the lawn south of the gymnasium. Music will be provided by the Wind Ensemble, directed by Keating Johnson. Faculty members escorting the graduates, faculty and platform party will be Dr. Judith Rymer (Education), faculty marshal; Dr. John Chaney (Administration), student marshal; and Dr. William Slout (Theatre Arts), college marshal.

The invocation and benediction this year will be given by Maura O'Neill, chaplain with the Newman Center in San Bernardino. In addition to conferring of degrees, Dr. Pfau will present the college's outstanding professor award to Dr. Frederick Newton (Psychology).

The Alumni Assn. again has arranged for a commercial photographer to take pictures of all graduates receiving their diplomas from President Pfau. Following the ceremony, everyone is invited to the traditional reception in the gymnasium.

The woman who holds the top nursing post in the country will speak on "Trends and Issues in Nursing" at 7:30 p.m., Monday, June 7, in the Recital Hall.

She is Jo Eleanor Elliott, director of the Division of Nursing of the U.S. Public Health Service, who also will give a lecture for nursing students from colleges throughout the area. This presentation, on the topic "The Nursing Climate for the Recent Graduate," will begin at 1:30 p.m. in the Commons.

The evening lecture will launch the Pfau Distinguished Lecture Series in Nursing, honoring President John M. Pfau. A brief ceremony recognizing Dr. Pfau will begin at 7:15 p.m. in the Recital Hall.

Admission to the afternoon lecture is free. Seats for the evening lecture will be \$10, with an additional \$10 charged for participants wishing to receive .2 unit of continuing education credit. BLUE CROSS/BLUE SHIELD: KNOWNS AND UNKNOWNS

The Personnel Office has provided a summary of the current status of Blue Cross/Blue Shield insurance coverage. First of all, the company has terminated its present health benefits plan with the State of

California as of July 31. Blue Cross/Blue Shield also has submitted and the State of California has accepted a new plan, effective Aug. 1.

It has not been determined whether there will be a June 15 open enrollment period, but at the present time this possibility seems unlikely. The open enrollment period probably will not be held until September. Also not known at the present is whether employees covered under the old plan automatically will be covered under the new plan.

Because of the unknowns, employees with Blue Cross/Blue Sheild coverage are urged to inform George Brundrett (Personnel) if they are going to be out of the area in June or the first part of July.
