Natural Sciences Dean Named



Dr. Louis Fernandez joins the campus community July 15 as the new dean for the School of Natural Sciences.

Dr. Louis A. Fernandez, dean of the College of Sciences at the University of New Orleans, will join Cal State on July 15 as dean of the School of Natural Sciences, reports Dr. Dennis Hefner (Academic Affairs). He will fill the position vacated by Dr. James Crum (Natural Sciences), who is returning full-time to the classroom.

"I'm very excited and my family is very excited about moving to California," says Fernandez. "I look forward to coming to a university and a region that's going to grow. The CSU and UC systems have fine reputations for providing progressive, quality education, particularly the CSU system. I think the San Bernardino campus will become the shining light in

the system. It's the place of the future."

In addition to continuing to provide quality teaching in the school, Fernandez says some of his initial goals include "working with department chairs, faculty members and administrators to expand research endeavors and academic programs as they are needed and warranted, and to reach out into the community." While he hopes to remain active in his own geological research interests, he says, "My top priority is to enlarge, improve and move the school ahead."

Teamwork will play a crucial role in the new dean's success. "I get a real sense of community at Cal State, and that's important to me," says Fernandez. "I'm impressed with the administration, department chairs and faculty members. I think we'll work well as a team and continue to improve."

Although he admits that the current budget crunch will provide some challenges, Fernandez views it as a temporary situation. "We're in a growth mode, and it's a matter of making do during the low (point in the budget situation). The faculty and

Coachella Valley Center Plans First Commencement Ceremony

Plans are underway at the Coachella Valley Center for this satellite campus' first Commencement ceremony scheduled for 2 p.m., Sunday, June 16, at the McCallum Theatre in Palm Desert.

"Holding Commencement in Palm Desert for the CVC is an important milestone in the development of our branch campus," says interim dean, Dr. Peter Wilson. "Our students are very excited about having their 'own' graduation ceremony. I hope many faculty and staff from the San Bernardino campus will attend."

Nearly 100 graduates will complete requirements for both

bachelor's and master's degrees. Full-time and part-time faculty members from the main campus who teach at the CVC will be invited to participate. President Anthony Evans and Vice President Dennis Hefner (Academic Affairs) will preside over the ceremony.

Currently, the CVC offers undergraduate degree programs in business, English, communication, psychology, liberal studies, social sciences and paralegal administration. Master's programs in education and public administration and various credential programs also are available.

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administration will need to hold the line until we can catch up. However, I don't think this low will last long." He notes that colleagues at the University of New Orleans describe their financial situation as "an economic roller coaster" and adds that he has been through eight mid-year budget cuts during the past 10 years.

During his 20-year affiliation with the University of New Orleans, Fernandez has held numerous administrative and academic appointments, including six years as dean of the College of Sciences and four years chairing the Department of Earth Sciences.

He holds a Ph.D. in geology from the University Graduate School in Syracuse, NY, and a master's degree in the same field from the University of Tulsa, OK. Fernandez earned his undergraduate degree in geology from City College of the City University of New York.

His professional affiliations include membership with the Geological Society of America, the American Mineralogical Society and the American Geophysical Union. Fernandez currently chairs the Advisory Committee of the American Geological Institute's Minority Participation Program and serves on the National Science Foundation's Advisory Committee for Earth Sciences.

Update on Administrative Searches

Four candidates are interviewing for the position of vice president for administration and finance between May 13 and 23, while the search committee for the dean of the School of Education has reopened its process and is seeking both the nomination of candidates as well as new applicants, reports the chairperson for both searches, Vice President Dennis Hefner (Academic Affairs).

The finalists for the vice presidency include Artherline Roberson, the associate vice chancellor for administration at St. Louis Community College; Nancy Dunn, former administrative dean at Harvard University; David DeMauro, currently serving as the acting vice president for the position here; and Richard Metz, vice president for administrative services at Frostburg State University.

Although the open forum was held Tuesday for Ms. Roberson, faculty and staff may meet with the other candidates for an hour each at the following times:

Commenting that the committee "feels very positive toward the four finalists because each has considerable demonstrated experience in the areas of financial planning and facilities planning and management," Hefner anticipates that the "VP" search will be concluded by "the end of this month."

Regarding the education dean search, Hefner says the position will remain open until filled. The committee currently is working "to expand the pool of applicants we had," he says, adding that he feels "very good about the applications that are coming in during this extended period."

Typifying the qualities he's looking for in the leader of the School of Education, Hefner lists several attributes. "They'll need to be (active) academically...to have a distinguished record of administrative accomplishments...to have the necessary interpersonal skills to mentor the large number of young faculty who have been recruited in the school during the past several years... (and to possess) proven leadership with the external community."

Hefner believes the committee will be able to successfully conclude the search process for the education dean before the summer.

Bloodmobile Returns to Campus

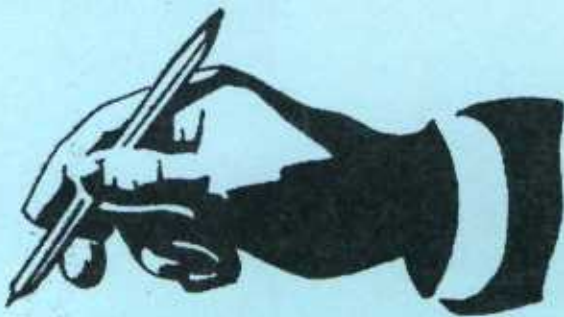

Special Car/Van Pool Parking Spaces Available

In an effort to promote ride-sharing, the university has designated 30 special parking spaces for car/van pool participants, reports Harry Larsen (Parking Services). The new spaces are located in Row 2 of the main campus lot near the Student Services Building and in Row 16 (the first row to the right of the main campus entrance) of the Commons parking lot. All spaces are marked with an upright sign with orange lettering on a white background. Vehicles with two or more occupants may use these spaces after obtaining a "Car/Van Pool Daily Parking Permit" from the attendant at the information booth located at the main campus entrance.

"We are responding to a mandate from the South Coast Air Quality Management District to reduce the number of vehicles coming on to campus," notes Larsen. "We will be evaluating usage on a daily basis. If the spaces are used to the fullest potential, then we may increase the number of spaces available to car/van pool participants." Romantic Comedy to be Performed

"The Importance of Being Earnest," Oscar Wilde's romantic farce considered by many in theatre circles to be one of the funniest plays ever written, opens Friday, May 31, in the University Theatre.

Originally performed on a London stage on Valentine's Day, 1895, the play follows the romances of Jack and Algernon, two gentlemen living within the confines of

Victorian society who find it quite necessary to break some rules to achieve their ends. Both go by the false name of Earnest, and it so happens that each of their respective romantic interests, Gwendolen and Cecily, have long dreamed of marrying a man named Earnest.

These are men and women, says Margaret Perry (Theatre Arts), who directs the play,

who are living in a world that "completely denies any human feelings and is built on social propriety. These are living, breathing people who have wants and needs and who are trapped trying to behave themselves."

As a result, adds Perry, "Most of the characters in the play are tremendously hypocritical. The thing that Wilde did in most of his plays is go after the hypocrisy in Victorian society."

Students starring in the production include Erik Pfeifer, who will play Jack, and Rob Foley, who is cast in the role of Algernon. Also appearing are Stacy Radford as Gwendolen, Nikki Fritz as Cecily and Jennie Butler as Lady Bracknell.

Performance dates for the play are May 31, June 1-2 and 5-9. The June 2 and 9 shows are Sunday matinees and begin at 2 p.m. Curtain time for all other performances is 8:15 p.m. All shows will be held in the University Theatre located in the Creative Arts Building. Tickets are \$7 for general admission, \$4 for senior citizens and \$3 for students. For tickets, call the Theatre Arts Department at Ext. 5876.

Athletic Fund Drive Begins Next Week

Building on the momentum established last year and aiming for a \$100,000 goal of cash, pledges and in-kind gifts, the Athletic Department's Second Annual Fund Drive officially kicks off on Wednesday, May 22, reports David Suenram (Athletics).

This year's drive is comprised of four components. Phase one consists of contacting members of the Athletic Association, a core group of approximately 200 individuals. During phase two, a newly instituted "Phone-a-thon" targets alumni and parents, while phase three consists of a select group of community leaders seeking substantial contributions from corporations and individuals. The drive's fourth phase will feature a variety of projects, such as a basketball tournament, 10-K run and baseball card show.

With the university's move to Division II competition this fall, a successful campaign is vital in the ability to offer scholarships for the first time. "I think we will meet our goal, and I think people will be responsive to our needs," says Suenram. "We have some very good people working on the drive. I think the community will support us."

Suenram notes that while scholarship funds will initially emphasize the men's and women's basketball programs, all campus sports will benefit from contributions raised during the upcoming campaign.
