

ALT Survey 2008/9 Summary Report

The ALT survey 2008/9 was conducted online from 8 Dec 08 - 16 Jan 09 and received a total of 312 responses, well exceeding the initial target of 200. We would like to thank everyone who took the time to respond to the survey and provided us with very valuable feedback. This report provides a summary of the results from the survey analysis and the conclusions drawn from it.

General Overview

The survey was comprised of 43 questions with particular sections on ALT activities and publications, the ALT website, different types of membership and new and future development of the ALT membership structure.

About ALT and its activities

The first part of the survey was focused on the Association and its activities. Figure 2 provides an overview of how different activities, events and publications were rated in the survey. The first figure indicates what percentage of respondents are aware of the relevant item, while the second figure indicates what percentage rate it excellent or good.



3	Awards such as the Learning Technologist of the Year Award	81%	41%
4	Fortnightly News Digest	75%	57%
5	Responses to policy consultations	55%	34%

Other activities which received very positive feedback are the ALT Certified Membership scheme CMALT, workshops and occasional publications.


Figure 3: Members' feedback

Members in general provided a lot of constructive feedback as to how ALT could improve its membership services. Figure 3 shows the most commonly mentioned ideas and issues:

Organisational and Sponsoring Members provided a lot of insight into how they value membership of ALT and what type of benefits they would like ALT to introduce including more professional development opportunities, the option to host ALT events within their institution or to network more. Throughout the analysis one aspect came out more than any other. Everyone values the ALT community and the support, networking and development opportunities that it provides.

The launch of the ALT Open Access Repository

In the survey, the most strongly supported new development was an open access repository containing post-prints of ALT-J and other learning technology materials, which over 80% of members wanted to see established. ALT has been working towards this as part of the JISC-funded wALTer project and the ALT Open Access Repository can now be accessed at <http://repository.alt.ac.uk>. The formal launch of the repository will take place at ALT-C 2009, 8-10 September in Manchester.
