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ABSTRACT

There have been a number of researches that presented information on the history of traditional hand embroidery wedding dress of the people in Makkah and Madinah, which is a way to preserve the heritage and to renew it. This study also intends to demonstrate what today's brides desire to wear, and also describe the methodology of collaborating the traditional hand embroidery with contemporary design. This study was conducted in order to identify certain aspects of young brides' personality as a factor for implementing special gown design. By using the existing knowledge of the elders from Makkah and Madinah on the traditional hand embroidery and feedbacks from young brides, it is found that majority of them do not have the knowledge and understanding of the hand embroidery heritage. Moreover, a theoretical analysis backed by observations from Makkah and Madinah's wedding dress shops, and Hejaz wedding ceremonies, indicates that young brides are attracted to the unique gown designs, such as traditional dresses that express their character. Quantitative results in the form of questionnaires are provided as evidence to show that modern gown designs embroidered with traditional hand embroidery is preferred by the young brides, who are responded to the questionnaire, and it also shows that it is feasible as a fashion item and is marketable in Makkah and Madinah's clothing stores. The final results showed that a large number of the respondents agreed with this concept of integrating contemporary gown with traditional hand embroidery, while only small groups of them disagreed. However, from these small groups, little number disagreed based on the reason that they do not have enough facts about this handicraft. It is believed that this concept the integrating contemporary design with traditional hand embroidery will benefit the Saudi's fashion industry, as well as a big step towards reviving wedding dress traditions and enhancing its productivity.

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CHAPTER ONE INTRODUCTION

1.1 INTRODUCTION

The hand embroidery is a beautiful and fine art. It is a handicraft that decorates fabrics for the purpose of making materials look beautiful. Decoration is usually done by using beads and sequins sewn using a needle with threads or yarns such as silk and metallic that requires great skills (Gadi, 2010). It is usually sewn onto special outfits like the panels of an expensive bridal gown. Embroidery is a handiwork that experts in the art of yarning and sewing pass down from one generation to another; an art with which the daughter can learn from her skilled mother (Naik, 1996). Consequently, all experts in the art of embroidery have preserved the knowledge of the perfect artistic movement, visualization and excellence across time.

This craft requires great skills and creativity. Great skills were acquired from elder people who are well-experienced on the arts and techniques. Elder people, in this context such as the mothers and grandmothers, are the typical people who teach their young daughters the skills until they achieved excellent work and performed well on their own. Through time, young people learned hand embroidery by observing previous handiworks. They usually started learning at a young age when they are able to learn the basics of hand embroidery or sewing. When they become older and more skillful with constant practice, they become experts in their handicraft (Naik, 1996). Each work leaves a mark and an impression of an individual person's knowledge and style making each work unique with its own personality, uniquely different from one another (Dhamija, 2004). Thus, this makes the embroidered work priceless and appreciated by everyone.

Every woman has a different lifestyle which helps her to be imaginative in her work. She brings about creative ideas from what she sees every day around her, such as the designs on buildings and any objects in her surroundings. She can also express her feelings or she may imitate other's piece of work, while at the same time mixing it with her personal experiences (Ali, 1993). Others can be travelers who wander from
