Mehmet Akif Ersoy commemorated

Ankara (A.A)- Mehmet Akif Ersoy, the poet who wrote the Turkish National Anthem, has been commemorated on the 53rd anniversary of his death.

Members of the Turkish Writer's Union, authors, intellectuals and scientists paid a visit to Tacettin Lodge at Hacettepe University Ankara, where the poet stayed during the years of the struggle for national independence and which has been turned into a museum.

During the commemoration ceremonies, speeches were made about Ersoy's work and life, and poems that he had written at the lodge were read.

Commemoration ceremonies were also organized in Konya for Mehmet Akif Ersoy, by the Governor's office and Selçuk University.

In his opening speech at the panel entitled "Mehmet Akif" at Selçuk University, the Dean of the University Prof. Halil Cin said that Ersoy was a shining idealist, renowned for his art, high morals, virtue

and patriotism.

Papers were later read at the panel relating to "Akif's place in Turkish history and education" and "Mehmet Akif's outlook on the Turkish language and literature".

At the ceremonies organized by the

Governor's office in the State Theatre, a selection of poems by Mehmet Akif were read and an account given of his personality.

National Anthem

The "Istiklâl Marşı" (The Independence March) was officially adopted as Turkey's National Anthem on March 12, 1921. Seven hundred and twenty-four poems were submitted in the competition organised for this march, and the one by the poet, Mehmet Akif Ersoy was adopted unanimously by the Turkish Grand National Assembly. In the competition for the music for the National Anthem, 24 composers participated. The Council, which

could not convene before 1924 due to the War of Liberation, adopted the music composed by Ali Rıfat Çağatay and the words were sung to this tune for eight years. Then it was changed to a composition by Zeki Ungör, conductor of the Presidential Symphony Orchestra and the words have been sung to this ever since.

The words and music of the Independence March are as follows:


