

WEAPONS SYSTEMS ACQUISITION: NEW MANAGEMENT CURRICULUM TO BEGIN MARCH 1971.

A new management program called <u>Weapons System Acquisition</u> is <u>tenatively</u> scheduled to begin operation in March 1971. The first 25 students are to commence their studies at this time initiating the 18 month program that will lead to a M.S. in Management. The requirements for awarding a M.S. have been approved by the Naval Postgraduate School Academic Council. The plan has been forwarded to the Chief of Naval Personnel for the expected final approval.

One of the recommendations of the Fitzhugh Panel was an overhaul of the weapons procurement program. It is hoped that graduates from the Weapons Systems Acquisition curriculum will be a vital step to correct the mismanagement that has occurred too frequently in the past in the Defense Department.

Classes will convene each March and September and students entering this program will be required to have an Engineering baccaulaureate degree with a pattern of above average grades in mathematics including Differential and Integral Calculus. The new curriculum will provide officers with a background and understanding of the management tools, techniques and fundamentals involved in contract definition, engineering development, procurement and logistic support of major weapons systems acquisition projects.

Students successfully completing this program will be awarded a M.S. Degree in Management. Completion of the program will also give the student a sub-speciality designation in Weapons System Acquisition. A recommendation from Chief of Naval Personnel to the CNO has included Project Manager positions for all captains to be "equivalent to Major Command." This change to the traditional career pattern is to influence young officers to aspire to serve in this new area of importance.
